MAJOR LIBELED BY **BRITISH WAR OFFICE**

LONDON. Feb. 19.—The British war office system of confidential reports on which officers of the army may be con-demned and sentenced to professional run without being heard in their own defence, was severely censured by the judge of the King's bench court today. A jury awarded Major W. Augustus Adam, formerly of the Royal Irish Lan-cers, the sum of \$10,000 damages against is Edward Ward in his capacity as bermanent secretary of the war office. Major Adam, who distinguished him-shif in the siege of Ladysmith, South Africa, and was at one time employed on special service in Japan, brought a suit for libel, alleged to be contained in a letter written and published by Sir Ed-ward Ward, saying that Major Adam had had to retire from the avery in con-sequence of adverse reports. 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
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
