"Twenty-seven of the larges states of India maintain imperial service troops, and the services of every corps were immediately placed at the disposition of the government of India on the outbreak of the war. The viceroy has accepted from 12 states contingents of cavalry, infantry, sappers and transport, besides camel corps from Bikaner."

A Hospital Ship.
The speaker added: "As particular instances of the generosity and eager loyalty of the chiefs the following may be quoted:
"The various durbars have com-

bined to provide a hospital ship to be called The Royalty, for the use of the expeditionary forces. The Maharaja of Mysore has placed fifty lakhs of rupees (\$1,750,000) at the disposal of the government of India for expenditure in connection with the expeditionary force. The chief of wallor, in addition to sharing in the penses of a hospital ship, the idea which originated with himself and the Begum of Bhopal, has offered to place large sums of money at the disposal of the government of India and to provide thousands of horses as remounts.
