refolved in the Affirmative; which Address and Petition was agreed to, as follows:

To the King's most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Addrefs and Petition of the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Commons of the City of London, in Common Council affembled.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Commons of the City of London, in Common Council affembled, are exceedingly alarmed that a Birl has passed your two Houses of Parliament, intituled, "An Act for making more effectual Provision for "the Government of the Province of Quebec, "in North America," which we apprehend to be entirely subversive of the great fundamental Principles of the Constitution of the British Monarchy, as well as of the Authority of various folemn Acts of the Legislature.

WE beg Leave to obferve, that the English Law, and that wonderful Effort of human Wifdom, the Trial by Jury, are not admitted by this Bill in any civil Cafes; and the French Law of Canada, is imposed on all the Inhabitants of that extensive Province, by which both the Perfons and Properties of very many of your Majesty's Subjects are rendered infecure and precarious.
