ANOTHER SCHOOL QUESTION This Time Walkerville Catholics Have Been Wrongly Assessed.

Walkerville, Nov. 19.—Walkerville is still troubled with the Roman Catholic separate school board, and unless the town, recedes from the position taken in the latest phase of the struggle, there promises to be more litigation.

The public school board has sent a notice to a new \$50,000 school and the cost of this was placed in the permanent improvement and the assessments levied this year on the building amounted to two mills, and Catholics and Protestants alike were assessed.

Rev. Fr. Beaudouin discovered that his parishioners were asked to help pay for the public school building when they have the right to a separate school. The result was that the town clerk and tax collector of Walkerville discovered that the Roman Catholics of Walkerville will resist payment, and if used he will ask for an injunction to restrain the town from collecting the tax.

Mayor Doble stated yesterday that the assessment of the Catholic residents was an error and that the town council will rectify it, as there is no intention of assessing the Catholics for public school expenditures.

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DEMONSTRATION AGAINST SULTAN IT MAY PRECIPITATE HOLY WAR

Expectation of the Powers that the Sultan Will Be an Easy Victim May Not Be Realized, and There is Danger of an Eastern Conflagration.

London, Nov. 18.—The powers are now fully committed to the coercion of Turkey and the execution of a policy that promises to create a situation of the first importance to the world at large. An international fleet of about twenty warships will assemble in Greek waters a few days hence and a so-called demonstration will take place at the entrance to the Dardanelles or at some Turkish port in Asia Minor.

The scheme in a nutshell provides for the collection of taxes by local authorities, such as the village head men, the whole to be under the supervision of a representative of the powers. A similar plan was submitted to the Sultan by a private syndicate a year ago, under the guise of a loan, which was to be guaranteed by the Sultan's lands and ample funds were offered by London and Berlin capitalists, but the offer was rejected, chiefly owing to the opposition of the Ottoman Bank.

The plan would have been acceptable to the Macedonians themselves and would be most profitable to the Turkish treasury. It was, however, rejected more than ten years ago. The bulk of the taxes are not waken by Turkish authorities appointed by the Constantinople government.

Sultan Will Resist. The powers engaged in the present campaign expect the Sultan to yield to pressure, if not immediately, then certainly after the bombardment of some spot on the Turkish coast. Information by expert judges of the Moslem situation leads to the opposite conclusion. The Sultan regards the present demands as a gross violation of his sovereignty, in effect no-

tion to quit Europe. He will never yield; indeed, he cannot do so. His position has been fundamentally altered since he was coerced by Europe after the Russo-Turkish war and more recently compelled to relinquish Crete. He has since attained the object of his thirty years' ambition, thanks chiefly to the Amiral Enver, who was allowed to go unpunished by Europe, and his victory over the Greeks, he has gained control of all Islam and has been recognized as the caliph of Mohammedans in the entire globe.

The wonderful success of Islamism has for its object a holy war against infidels, and the mass of its followers believe that this is the duty of the Sultan. He has, therefore, an immense force, cannot yield a fraction more of his sovereignty without resistance, and without summoning all of his faith to his assistance.

Holy War Feared. This, again, is the appalling danger which the powers will incur if they resort to force in imposing their demands. A holy war would blind Great Britain in India and Egypt, and France in Algiers and Morocco, besides bringing about a wholesale massacre of Christians in Constantinople which has so long been threatened. It has been suggested that if a mere demonstration by an international fleet fails to induce the Sultan to yield, they will force the Dardanelles and anchor off Constantinople. The best of authorities believe that this is next to impossible. Whatever else may be rotten in Turkey, the defenses of the Dardanelles are as complete and efficient as modern resources can make them. Foreign intervention is the best of all things, and it will be noted, while protesting cooperation with the movement, is sending ships, and her future course is uncertain.

Getting Ready. Constantinople, Nov. 18.—The Porte has not yet replied to the ultimatum of the powers regarding Macedonian reforms, and the embassies here are sending Dragoons to France in preparation for the possibility of a naval demonstration.

Germany Made a Bad Cake Campaign is Too Costly. Both as Regards Men and Money Southwest Africa Proves a Sinkhole.

London, Nov. 18.—Since the beginning of the unfortunate campaign in Southwest Africa, the total German loss is reckoned at 1842 men, including civilians; 1055 military persons have died either in battle or from sickness; 598 were wounded. Besides these, 750 officers and men have been sent home broken in health.

As the campaign may continue another year, the number of men already poured out on those arid deserts. As colonial experts have assured the German government, the cost of the campaign cannot support more than 5000 white families, there is a serious shortage of the necessary personnel for the restoration of the German presence.

Prof. van der Stoep, a well-known German government has done more to increase the ranks of the social democracy than the ill-fated expedition in Southwest Africa. There will be some angry recriminations and much excited debate when the Reichstag meets next March, and the government proposals for fresh taxation of beer and tobacco to the tune of 200,000,000 marks annually.
