Deer Park.

It is expected that there will be a lively time at the meeting of the York Township Council next Monday evening when the Toronto & York Radial Railway Co. will apply for the right of constructing a switch and a line on St. Clair-avenue, to enable the company to run a car shed and repair shop on the O'Halloran property. The revised statutes say: "The company shall have the right to construct, put in, maintain, and operate, and to have the right to use, such switches, switches and turnouts as may from time to time be necessary for the operating of the company's line of railway on Yonge-street, or for the purpose of leading to, any track allowances or right of way on lands adjacent to Yonge-street, where the company's line of railway crosses, or to the company's power houses and car sheds, and the company may from time to time alter the location of such switches, switches and turnouts."

Next Friday evening the Raters' Association will meet in the public school building for the election of officers and to consider municipal topics.

Health Officers Seek Physicians' Help in Fight Against White Scourge

The Kansas State Board of Health has made a new move against tuberculosis. Letters are being mailed to every physician asking for information about all cases of tuberculosis which have come under their observation, and requesting their co-operation with the State Board in the fight against consumption.

Dr. Crumline, Secretary of the Board, has issued a pamphlet containing the following rules:

"All persons in State and County employ are positively forbidden to spit upon the floors.

"Rooms, hallways, corridors and lavatories shall be freely aired and effectually cleaned at least once a day, and not during working hours.

"Dust must be removed as completely as possible by means of dampened cloths or mops. It should never be needlessly stirred up by a broom or duster, as this practice only spreads the dust and germs."

CATARACT COMPANY LOSES SUPREME COURT AGAINST IT

Must Pay Percentage on Fares Sold on Jockey Club Line to City Treasury.

Hamilton, Dec. 11.—(Special.)—The city has won one more victory in the courts over the Cataract Power Company. The company contended that it was not called upon by its agreement to pay a percentage of its earnings on the Jockey Club line, and that it had to pay a percentage only on fares collected, and not tickets sold. Word was received to-day that the supreme court had decided against the company and in favor of the city.

Mayor Biggar has appointed Aldermen Stewart, Wilson and Howard as the special committee to ascertain from the Cataract Power Company the price at which it will sell the street railway to the city.

Perfects Reading of Ore.

The North American Cobalt Refining Company has been conducting experiments in smelting Cobalt ore in the old Hoopner Refining Company's building, and claims to have perfected a process by which it can completely separate arsenic, cobalt and other by-products from the silver. It is thought that the company will establish its plant here, with a capacity of 500 tons a day. The cost of the plant is estimated at about \$200,000.

E. E. Wingate has begun an action for \$500, the amount he claims from the city for picking out route through the parks for the Hamilton, Waterloo and Guelpah Railway.

THE EXPERIMENTAL UNION REPORTS GOOD YEAR'S WORK

Excellent Addresses on Practical Subjects Listened to by Large Number of Farmers.

The 28th annual meeting of the Ontario Agricultural and Experimental Union began on Monday and was concluded yesterday. The meetings were held in the splendid amphitheatre of the Massey Hall and were attended by farmers, professors, students and farm lovers of all kinds in increasing numbers. President George Robertson of St. Catharines occupied the chair and conducted the meetings with that promptness that prevents ennui on such occasions.

On Monday the advisability of enacting a law to control the sale of fertilizers was discussed. Prof. W. M. Hays, assistant secretary of agriculture in the United States, read a paper on the improvement of plants and animals in both Canada and the United States. TARIFF DEPUTATIONS.

Ottawa, Dec. 11.—A large deputation of boot and shoe manufacturers from rate on boots and shoes from 25 per cent to 35 per cent.
