Osborn declares that records in the notary's office at Mamaroneck, which show that Herbert Obthat date, will prove his statement. He said that assumed names were used because at the time both he and Miss Maloney desired to keep the marriage

The fact that the marriage had taken place did become known, however, according to Osborn, and he declares that among those who learned of it was young Clarkson.
