

Mr. Rew examined the condition of agriculture as it was 100 years ago, as it was in 1846, and as it is now, very impartially, and while he could not ask the farmers to look for protection, he pointed out that the claim set up in certain of our industries for a living wage logically involved in the end protective duties, and that the working classes, who will in the long run have their will, do not shrink from protection as a possible expedient. It is obvious that no industry can fix the cost of production or any material part of it, such as labor, and allow unrestricted competition from countries where the cost is lower. Prices must rule wages, and if the latter are to be kept up to a certain level, the former must be kept up too.
