Washington, Aug. 27.—It is feared in otficial circles here that the withdrawal of the French Ambassador from Constantinople marks the dissolution of the concert of European powers under which the integrity of Turkey was guaranteed. Aitho several times severely strained—notably by such events as the last war between Turkey and Greece—this pact has so far endired without amendment, but it is apprehended now that if the action of France shall be carried out to the extreme indicated in the despatches each of the signatory powers will feel obliged in self protection to disregard the agreement and other claims that have accumulated in the past quarter of a century, with a result of disrupting the present Turkish government.

the Date. London, Aug. 28 .- "Li Hung Chang has actified the ministers of the powers that the Chinese plenipotentiaries are now authorized to sign the protocol," says a despatch to The Times from Pekin, dated yesterday, "and has requested them to fix a date for the signing.

"An edict concerning the importation of arms was circulated among the ministers to-day. Two other edicts are still required to complete the protocol."

# MASSACRE IN MANCHURIA.

Chinese Were Mistaken for Insurgents and Killed.

Victoria, B.C., Aug. 27.—Chinese papers received by the Empress contain accounts of a massacre of Chinese in the Kwan Tien Nien district of Manchuria, the Russians excusing the massacre by the statement that peasants killed were mistaken for insurgents. Few details are given.

Further troubles in Mongolia and Manchuria are reported, and, according to The North China Daily News, the Russians have placed 20,000 men on the Manchuria-Corean frontier to cope with the rebels.

The Shanghai Mercury publishes a letter from Rev. Frank Harman of Chou Ping, who has been journeying thru North Shan Tung, to the effect that Boxers are drilling and preparing for a rising in that province. Christians have been openly threatened.
