Funds Getting Low.

The Street Cleaning Account Overdrawn \$95.
The Mayor's Report Re Mr. Chipman's Engagement.

The Matter of Mr. Ashbridge's Dismissal Referred to the Council—A New Street.

The Board of Works was last evening honored with the presence of the Mayor. The others present were Ald. Parnell (chairman), Ald. Dreaney, O'Meara, Wm. Heaman, Cooper and Pritchard.

When the question of gravel came up, Ald. O'Meara said the street railway's gravel contract expired on Saturday, yet since that time gravel had been drawn by them and deposited in various places. Little wanted to know by whose authority this had been done.

Ald. Parnell explained that there was a little balance owing the city by the Street Railway Company, and he had assumed the responsibility of taking it out in this way.

“Allow me, Mr. Chairman,” said Ald. O'Meara, “to tell you that you didn't have any money coming to you according to your own statement made a short time ago. If you had, it would have been a great deal of money to spend the city's money.”

Ald. Dreaney—There's a great deal of that sort of thing.

Ald. O'Meara—There's too much of it. Ald. Dreaney—It was the same way with Central avenue.

Ald. Cooper—Excuse me, I had a right to all the gravel I got. Ald. Parnell—Well, gentlemen, it was left to me, and it was done in the interests of the city. All I have to say is, if there is any gravel, I can soon vacate the chair.

Ald. O'Meara—That doesn't remedy the matter. You had no right to do it without first coming to the committee or council.

Ald. Parnell—Is there any action to be taken in the matter?

Ald. O'Meara—The only action I'll take is to vote against paying the account.

Ald. Parnell—I don't suppose you'll have to.

Ald. O'Meara—I don't propose to sit here and be blindfolded.

Ald. Parnell—I don't propose to sit here and be accused of blindfolding anyone.

“Peace and quietness, gentlemen,” said Mayor Little, “and you cooled down. The mayor said he thought all the wards had fared pretty well this year, and he felt gratified. The streets generally were in fine condition.”

Ald. Parnell—Wasn't the matter of that gravel referred to the chairman and engineer with power?

Ald. Heaman—Yes, and I guess they did get the power. (Laughter.)

Secretary Bell informed the committee that the street cleaning account had been overdrawn \$94.64, and that there was no right to do work done. He read the following statement of cash paid out of appropriations of No. 2 account.

The chairman said there could be no more street cleaning done and the matter had been brought up to the council, and some of the balance turned over to the committee.

Ald. Heaman—I'll move that the \$13,250 from the band concerts be divided between myself and Ald. Cooper.

“I'll second that,” said Ald. Cooper. “I just suite me.”

“Nice,” said Ald. Pritchard. Ald. Parnell—We can't pay any more for street cleaning before we get authority from the council.

Ald. O'Meara—Take it out in trade the same as you did with the street railway.

each month—48 days in the year. He would, if there were no other pressing business, remain for as much as ten days in the month. He also agreed to come when he is required by the city. The mayor thought the city was fortunate in securing the services of such an experienced engineer, and if he were engaged he could be held responsible for the work. He thought the committee should recommend the council to engage him, and hold him responsible.

Ald. Pritchard—I object. There are some engineers in this city who are capable of doing the work. There are too many engineers now.

Ald. Cooper—Let us deal with Ald. Pritchard, and the matter was referred to the council.

In speaking again, the mayor said he believed the engineering work should be done from the city engineer's office. He believed in one engineer for everything, one city solicitor, and one treasurer. The city engineer had plenty to do, and if Mr. Chipman were appointed supervisor of the work he could be held responsible.

Ald. Pritchard then moved that Mr. Ashbridge's services be dispensed with.

Mayor Little said he would recommend to the council that Mr. Ashbridge be kept. There was plenty of work, and there would be much more until the completion of the sewers. One engineer did the work of street commissioner, and when not engaged in that he was busy in the office. There was enough to keep Mr. Ashbridge busy all the time.

Ald. Cooper thought Mr. Ironside as good as was dead.

Ald. Pritchard said the water pipes were laid without any extra help, and he thought the sewer could be too. He said Engineer Keating, of Toronto, and the late Engineer Robinson had been able to deal with the things, and he didn't see why this city engineer couldn't do the same.

Ald. O'Meara said a man like Mr. Robinson couldn't be gotten every day. It was finally agreed to send the matter to the council.

In answer to a question the mayor said that the plans were all ready for the work on some streets from the river to the siphon.

Ald. Pritchard wanted the work begun at once, and to have it done by day labor.

Ald. Heaman said some sections would have to be done by contract.

On Ald. Pritchard's motion it was decided to do all the work possible by day work, giving married men the preference.
