New Orleans La., Aug. 23. - The Picayune's special cable from Havana says: In spite of Government denials the revolutionary movementin Cuba has assumed formidable proportions. The whole island is in a ferment over the uprising, and it is impossible to predict at this time what the final result will be. The Government claims that It will be able to suppress the revolt within two or three weeks, but conservative people do not believe that the revolution can be crushed so easily The revolutionists have been preparmg for the struggle ever since the presidential election, and the Palma DEATH SUMMONS administration has under-estimated their strength.

Bandera Killed.

Havana, Aug. 23. - Gen. Quintin attorney. Bandera, the famous leader of Havana Province, who recently headed an insurgent band, and began operating against the Government, was killed early this morning in an encounter with rural guards.

The fight with Bandera's band occurred at 3 o'clock this morning. A force of a hundred mounted rural guards. which had for three days been seeking to surround the insurgent force, commanded by Bandera, finally succeeded in so doing, after the veteran commander had pitched his camp for the night. In addition to Bandera, two of his followers were killed, but not one of them was captured.

Dublin, Aug. 23. - The Irish Catholic Journal today outlines what it believes is the Government programme for Irish legislation at the next session of Parliament. This programme will include the formation of a central electoral council, charged with most of the duties of the local government board and other Dublin castle boards, the establishment of an exchequer, into which all moneys now allocated to Irish account shall henceforth be paid, and the creation of a tribunal to deal with private wills.
