London Girls Not Volunteering in Sufficient Numbers.

Unless a sufficient number of girls n the London district volunteer within the next few days for berry-picking, it will be necessary to send to Toronto for reinforcements. according to a statement made today to The Advertiser by Miss Ethel MacRoberts, superintendent of the Women Government Employment Bureau.

"Apparently the girls do not realise the great improvement."

"Apparently the girls do not realize the great improvement in wage conditions this year, notwithstanding the publicity given in the paper," she continued, adding, "However, today will tell the story about the way girls are feeling about berry-picking this year, Probably a number have been waiting until after the Dominion Day holiday before coming to register."

Forty-five pickers are required for the Springbank fruit belt, and those who are to live in the camp at Springbank are expected to report by Thursday night. A number of girls have applied from outside points, but the response to the call has not yet been large in London.

Only girls owr 16 years old, who will sign up for four or five weeks are being accepted. Miss MacRoberts, superintendent of the Women's Government Bureau, states that in making application the prospective pickers will be expected to give their age, height and weight.

21 German Planes Dropped by French Last Day of June

Six Captive Balloons Also Set on Fire - Heavy

PARIS, July 1.—The French airmen have played their part in the increased aerial activity which has been displayed along the front in the last few days. Yesterday they brought down or put out of action 21 German planes and set on fire six captive balloons, according to the war office announcement tonight to the war office announcement tonight.

The following night our bombing machines dropped 22 tons of projectiles on aviation grounds in Picardy, the Roye railway station, and munitions depots at Villers-Carbonnel, where a violent explosion occurred."


