SUMMER SESSION OPEN

Special "U" Course Opened at Western Today.

The summer session of Western University opened today, and will continue for six weeks. The course prescribed consists of botany, physics, mathematics, Greek, French, German and history. The first two years of the general course in arts will be completed by the summer session. The regular professors will compose the summer school staff. In addition to these, Professor Vassett of Mercerburg Academy, in the United States, will lecture in French. The lectures will be given from 8 a.m. to noon each school day, and the afternoon will be devoted to laboratory work. The fees are \$10 per course, or \$30 for three or more courses, and any three of the subjects comprise a course. Today is registration day, and according to Dr. K. P. H. Neville, registrar of the university, the advance correspondence indicated that a large class will be in attendance, many coming in from out of town.

Accommodation will be found for students whose homes are not in London and if necessary quarters will be opened in Huron College. Successful students in this course will receive university credit in their work corresponding to that of the regular university. The examination will be held at the completion of the course, which concludes on August 9.

MEETS HERE THURSDAY

Western Counties Telephone Association Convention Starts July 4.

The eighth annual meeting of the Western Counties Telephone Association will be held in the county council chamber here on Thursday, July 4. A large number of representatives of rural phone concerns of the district are expected to attend. H. Smith of Woodstock, president of the Association, will preside at the convention. Addresses will be delivered by prominent members of the association, and in addition to this, P. Daggert, an Ontario Railway and Municipal Board expert, will speak at the convention. An important matter for discussion at the gathering will be the problem of meeting the present high cost of operating, and it is likely that the meeting will decide to increase the revenue on rural phones.

London Girls Not Volunteering in Sufficient Numbers.

What Will Result if Alberta Court's Decision Is Upheld?

40,000 SUCH INSTANCES

By Time Final Adjudication Is Secured, Men Will Be Overseas.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

OTTAWA, July 1.—The majority finding of the Alberta appeal court in the application for habeas corpus made by R. B. Bennett, K.C., ex-M.P., on behalf of Norman Earl Lewis, a young farmer who was at first exempted under the military service act and who later had the exemption withdrawn by virtue of the provisions of the order-in-council of last April, has created something of a sensation at Ottawa.

The finding of the judges was in effect that as the exemption had been granted under the terms of the military service act, 1917, which is an enactment of parliament, it could not be taken away through the order-in-council which cannot supersede a statute.

When it is considered that some 40,000 men between the ages of 20 and 22 respectively have been affected by the order-in-council providing for peremptory drafting without consideration of exemption some idea of the interest created here by the finding may be gained.

Government Feels Queerly. When it is further considered that nearly all of the business of the country has been carried on by order-in-council for the past six months or more, some appreciation of the concern which the Government feels may be obtained.
