400 Quit Work in Moose Jaw and Calgary Civic Employees Revolt.

COMPANY MAKES OFFER

Senator Robertson Shows Concern-Prosecution Is Entered.

MOOSE JAW, Oct. 17 .- Four hunred of the C. P. R. employees connected with the Brotherhood of Railway Carmen and the machinists' helpers walked out of the shops this morning, and the yardmen are threatening to take similar action. They say they are on strike in sympathy with their comrades at Calgary and in defiance of the recent order of the Federal Government that there should be no more strikes during the war.

CITY EMPLOYEES STRIKE.
CALGARY, Oct. 17.—In sympathy with the striking Canadian Pacific freight handiers all outside employees of the city of Calgary, with the exception of the employees of the Municipal Electric Railway, went on strike this morning. Waterworks, electric light, health department, sewer maintenance and street cleaning employees are concerned.

As there is two weeks' supply of water in the city reservoir, no cemplications in that direction are feared. Furthermore, the city this morning took advantage of an offer of the strikers to man the Bow River pumps and to provide enough men for the sanitary department, so that the health of the citizens would not be endangered.

NEW OFFER TO MEN.
OTTAWA, Oct. 17.—In view of the growing seriousness of the freight hadiers' strike in Western Canada. Senator Gideon Robertson today had conferences with representatives of the Canadian Pacific Railway, as a result of which the company has consented to an adjustment of the difficulties on a basis more favorable to the men than hitherto proposed.

The company agrees to reinstate all the men on strike outside the city of Calgary, and at least 75 per cent of the ones on strike at Calgary, the remaining 25 per cent to be dealt with by the company. The company agrees when these men return to work to submit all matters in dispute to the railway adjustment board.

Proposal Is Forwarded.

Senator Robertson has forwarded the company's proposal to Mr. Carr of Winnipes, the representative of the men, whom he has requested to advise him as to whether or not the men are agreeable to the proposal as a basis of settlement of the strike.

"My own view," said Senator Robertson, "is that the men would be well advised to accept an adjustment of the matter on this basis, because other questions in dispute can be satisfactorily settled by the railway adjustment board."

PARIS, Oct. 17.-An English officer at Cambral had his hand torn off yesterday by one of the enemy's infernal traps, says a special dispatch to the Temps. Seeing a plano abandoned in the middle of a street, he struck a chord and an explosion followed, which ripped off his hand. A grenade had been placed in connection with the keys.

The Temps correspondent warns returning inhabitants of Cambrai to be careful in correcting any lack of order they may find in their homes, to beware of straightening pictures, replacing door panels which they find loosened, removing nails, and of touching objects they may find in the yards. Such action, he says, may explode an infernal machine.

HUNS FIGHT HARD TO **HOLD PIVOT BETWEEN** DOUAL AND DENAIN

All Costs.

WITH THE CANADIAN FORCES, Oct. 16.—Beyond sending patrols across the Sensee River at Aubigny-au-Bac the front of the Canadian Corps has been practically static during the past two days. This does not mean that the line is quiet. On the contrary it is very active. The enemy harasses us continually with machine gun fire from across this watery waste, and last night shelled us heavily. His snipers are busy, and altogether our men would prefer getting forward to holding the present line which extends from the southwest of Douai on the west side of the Canal de la Sensee to the south bank of the Sensee River, and thence east where we have contact with the

cash where we have contact with the British troops.

Orders To Hold Salient.

Prisoners state that orders have been given to hold at all costs this salient thrust out in front of the radial line between Doual and Denain. This, in fact, is his new pivot, replacing for the time being lost positions back of Cambral and held in strength, while he continues his methodical retirements north and the river is certainly no more difficult than that successfully accomplished by the Canadlan troops elsewhere this autumn, particularly the passage of the Canal du Nord.




