Dressed poultry was a feature of a
comparatively small market this morn-
ing. Chickens and ducks were offered
in abundance, while many geese and a
few turkeys were also sold. The prices
remained steady.

Much dressed pork was offered. Whole
hogs sold at \$20 to \$22 a cwt., by the
quarters 24 cents and 25 cents a pound
for front and 25 cents and 26 cents
for hind quarters.

Potatoes went up in price. Some
farmers were asking \$2 a bag and sev-
eral lots sold at that figure, but \$2.75
was the average quotation.

up a little, selling at 65 cents whole-
sale and 68 cents to 70 cents retail.

New York, Nov. 28.—Many of the in-
fluences which contributed primarily to
the mid-November break in the stock
market were again operative this week.
To these were added disquieting con-
ditions in the foreign financial situation,
and fresh disturbances in Mexico.
From London and Paris came cables
and news of the foreign financial situa-
tion at those centres in darkest colors, while
the diplomatic developments with Mex-
ico assumed new and more delicate propor-
tions. Stock transactions were com-
paratively moderate, but the shorts con-
tinued to press their recent advantage,
again attacking the high-priced indus-
trial and specialties. In no important
case, however, excepting U. S. Steel,
did prices react to lowest levels of the
past fortnight. Although call money
ruling mostly at 7 per cent, going to 10
per cent yesterday, banks and other
lending institutions exercised greater
care in negotiating loans. Time money
was in small supply and surface con-
ditions indicated that the recent warn-
