CANOE ROUTE FOR FREIGHT

C.P.R. Will Have Several Hundred Small Craft to Open Up Short Road to Gowganda.

MONTREAL, March 8 .- (Special.)-It was officially announced by the Canadian Pacific to-day that the company in order to avert suffering and possible famine in the new mining region, have decided as soon as the frost breaks to open a canoe freight route from Bisco, on the C.P.R. line, thirty-five miles west of Sudbury-to Gowganda. The centre of the mining region will be by this route twenty-two miles nearer Toronto than by way of Charlton on the T. & N. O. Railway.

The company will have some hundreds of canoes and launches at work, there being long stretches of lake nav-

there being long stretches of lake nav-lgation on which launches can be used. The company will put horses on the long portages in order to facilitate quick transshipment. One of the most favorable features of the route is that there is no upstream work. Mr. Fielding brought down the revised. insurance bill to-day. It draws the teeth of the bill submitted a year ago and withdrawn after discussion in the banking and commerce committee. As foreshadowed, there is more laxity allowed the insurance companies in

the way of investments. There was no change, Mr. Fielding said, with respect to assessment insurance. A proposal in relation to these institutions was made in the bill these institutions was made in the bill of last year, but even if that bill had been gone on with, the proposal with regard to these institutions would have been withdrawn. The principal companies in that line represented that they recognized the need of strengthening their position and desired to be left to themselves for that purpose. There had been some changes in respect to investments. Section 60 of the new bill provides that any life insurance company which derives its corporate powers from an act of the

surance company which derives its corporate powers from an act of the parliament of Canada, or which is within the legislative power of the parliament of Canada, may invest its funds, or any portion of them, in the purchase of: The debentures, bonds, stocks or securities of or guaranteed by the government of Canada or Great Britain, or any dependency thereof, or guaranteed by the government of any foreign country, or any state forming foreign country, or any state forming a portion of any such foreign country wherein the company carries on, or is about to carry on, its business of life insurance, or any school or municipal corporation in Canada or elsewhere, were the company is carrying on business.
