Broomhall estimates the wheat and flour shipments for Monday will be about 1,200,000 bushels, of which quantity Europe will take about 6,400,000 bushels.

Total world's shipments last week amounted to 9,008,000 bushels and those of a year ago 5,664,000 bushels. Arrivals of breadstuffs into the U.K. will aggregate about 4,000,000 bushels. He predicts that there will be a fair decrease in the quantity on passage to the U.K.

Modern Miller says: With favoring weather soft winter wheat will begin to move freely next week, and hard winter a week later. Cutting and threshing have been delayed by frequent rains in Tennessee, Kentucky, Southern Indiana and Ohio and some sprouting in shock, rust, bilght and smut is reported.
