JURY WAS SATISFIED WITHOUT AN AUTOPSY
Decide That Lee Died From Natural Causes—H. G. & B. Cars Collide With S.A. Excursionists.

HAMILTON, Aug. 11.—(Special.)—That he came to his death from natural causes, was the verdict of the coroner's jury which investigated the case of Stanley Frank Lee, the remittance man and porter, who was found dead in his bed at the Cecil Hotel Tuesday morning. "There was very little to suggest natural causes," said Dr. McCallum, who helped to perform the autopsy. He said that it was possible that he did die from natural causes, however, but he could not tell without having an analysis of the stomach contents. The jury did not think it necessary to order the autopsy. Dutch Colyer and Jack Sayers, bartenders; James Cairns, night clerk; and J. W. Donovan, a friend, said that they had never heard Lee threaten to end his life.

An H. G. and B. car, filled with Salvation Army excursionists, returning from Grimsby, was allowed by an open switch to collide with another H. G. and B. car standing in the terminal on both cars were cut and bruised, but none seriously hurt. Among the women seriously injured were Miss E. G. Gibb, 123 Bay-street, and Miss Price, the matron of the Rescue Home.

Mrs. Grace Scarrow, 230 North West-avenue, who was badly burned at Winton's last night thru her clothing catching fire from a coal oil lamp extinguisher, had not recovered consciousness fully at a late hour tonight, and chances of recovery are not considered bright.
