Political Intelligence

Jack Hunter, of the Kincardine Reporter (Lib.) is out against the Toronto managers of his party, who propose to call a Liberal convention in Toronto next year, observing that "the demand for a policy does not arise from the solid Liberal of the rural district, but is carried along by a few men who are fanatical fads. These men mostly reside in Toronto."

Mr. Hunter declares that a convention in the near future would be a real injury to the Liberal party, that no convention could supply them with as good ammunition as the mistakes by Sir James Whitney and his government.

The Dominion Parliament will open on Thursday next and it looks now as if the Liberal policy of the government will become of the big issues. While Mr. Borden has reaffirmed his attitude as one of agreement with the program outlined by Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his colleagues, to found a Canadian navy "in co-operation and in close relation to the imperial navy," it seems probable that on the details of the scheme there will not be such serious unanimity.

It will be remembered that the question of naval defence of the empire was projected into the house of commons by Sir John, George E. Foster, when he moved a resolution declaring "that the time has come for Canada to assume her proper share of responsibility and financial burden in the maintenance of the British fleet."

Mr. Borden declared against making money contributions to the British navy. He suggested instead that we should create a navy of our own; and after some hours conference between the two leaders, a resolution to establish our own navy was accepted by both sides.

In Toronto, last Monday night Mr. Borden discussed the naval policy at a meeting of Centre and South Toronto Conservatives. He adhered to the program adopted by both sides last session, but went further and met the objections of some of his friends, who are against the "tin pot" navy idea, by saying that his resolution contemplated not only such assistance as a full blown Canadian navy might render in the responsibility in case of pressing emergency. This responsibility could only be met by the creation of a navy of our own, which says that "that policy is the only one to be followed."

Mr. Borden is supported in his view by the Evening Journal of Ottawa (Cons.), which says that "that policy is the only one to be followed."

WIDENING ST. CLAIR AVENUE

Big Boon to the New Sub-Division Known Now as "Oakwood."

Of course you have noticed in the press the movement underway to widen St. Clair-avenue to at least one hundred feet. 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THE PROBLEM OF DISTRIBUTION.

There is nothing more exasperating than to go into a store for some article upon which you have set your mind and find that the store does not keep it. Yet this is very likely to be the result with some new product that you have just seen advertised. The question is "How can this condition be remedied?"

Like most other questions of moment there is no "crockery" answer. As most manufacturers know, it is comparatively easy to make articles, but it is not so easy to get them into the hands of the consumer when you try to sell a distribution is the vital part of the selling scheme.

In the first place the jobber, like the rest of mankind, is interested chiefly in himself. Left to himself he is apt to follow the paths of least resistance and most profit. Unless you can offer him remarkable inducements, he is not apt to push your goods and ordinarily it is impossible for you to offer sufficient inducements. The jobber is frequently represented as a heartless sort of animal, but it is not necessary to take this extreme view to see that the dealer is not susceptible to a greater extent. He cannot afford to do more than supply his trade with the goods that it requires. His lines are varied, his territory wide, perhaps, and while he plays an important part in many plans of distribution, he is somewhat out of sympathetic touch with the whole proposition. He can be roughly compared to an electric wire, which carries the current from the generator to the light. The dealer is the most susceptible, but it is not the dynamo's interest in the manufacture of the current or the light's interest in its use.

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MME. STEINHEIL WILTS

UNDER JUDGE'S FURY

Led Fainting From Courtroom For Three Days of Persistent Ferocious Questioning.

PARIS, Nov. 5.—After having withstood for nearly three days a merciless examination at the hands of the presiding judge of the court of the assizes, where she is being tried on a charge of murdering her husband and her step-mother, the iron nerves of Mme. Steinheil gave way late this afternoon, and she was led from the courtroom in a state of collapse.

Several times before the climax came, the judge's questions were so ferocious that Mme. Steinheil was obliged to stop for a moment to recover her breath,
