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ACCOUNTANTS SHOULD
PROTECT THEMSELVESFrom Foreign Invasion and Lessening
of Standards—Dominion As-
sociation in Convention Here.

The Dominion Association of Chartered Accountants opened its council meeting in the King Edward yesterday. The association was formed in 1904, and has this year been reorganized so as to include the various provincial institutions, each member of the latter being now ipso facto a member of the association. About 150 members and ladies arrived yesterday, and more are expected to-day.

The president, A. P. Riddell, of Montreal, in his address dealt with the association's objects, which are: To promote good fellowship among the members; to promote the Dominion exchange of ideas; and the standardization of C. A. examinations in the various provinces.

The work of an accountant in some cases resembles that of the medical and legal professions. "We are all seekers after truth," he said. "It is our business to see that business transactions are fully and truthfully expressed."

"Organization—its Objects and its Attainment," was an address by Geo. Edwards, and "Uniformity Among Provincial Societies," one by A. K. Plisk of Montreal.

Mr. Edwards mentioned the necessity of adopting some definite attitude towards non-Canadian societies. While the Canadians felt great respect and goodwill towards the outsiders, exception was taken to the policy in England of meddling with legislation in which they had no concern. The charters of the English societies gave them no status outside of the United Kingdom.

"The policy of this association," said the speaker, "should be firmly to resist every attempt at colonial aggression by non-Canadian societies in like manner, our Canadian societies must not meddle in non-Canadian business."

Mr. Plisk's paper dealt with bylaws, practice before the test of one examination. While the system of apprenticeship was justly unpopular in this country, regulations could be made which would ensure a second test before granting the degree of fellow, as well as a period of active practice.

Mr. Plisk also said that all were agreed in a desire to see legislative enactments imposed on all companies of limited liability, to have their accounts audited by degree-holding members of the profession.

OTTAWA RIVER GETTING LOW.

On June 13 it stood at 15 feet at the foot of the locks and now it has gone down to 9 feet 9 inches, a drop of five feet three inches within the last month.
