TURNER JURY DISAGREE DISMISSED BY JUDGE TO ACQUIT

Chancellor Boyd's Charge to Jury Was Against the Prisoner—Case Will Be Tried Again in March.

Nine of the twelve men empaneled to try Mrs. Minnie Turner in the criminal case would have acquitted her of the charge of having performed an illegal operation upon Rose Winters last August. Three men stood out for conviction.

This was at 1 o'clock yesterday afternoon after just 4 hours and 25 minutes' deliberation upon the evidence. On the first ballot, taken immediately after leaving the court room at 12.25 o'clock in the morning the jurors stood six to six. Those for acquittal gradually won over three upon the ground of doubt, but when finally asked by Chancellor Boyd if it would be possible for them to arrive at a verdict should they be given more time, their foreman replied, "No, my lord, it is hopeless."

They were accordingly discharged. As the judge took his seat and while the jury fled into their chairs the prisoner sat with drawn white face in the bright light of the court room. She had no color, her eyes were closed and her hands were clenched.

UNDERGROUND RAIL FOR LIFE

40 Miners in Seven-Mile Dash in Dark to Escape Fire Peril.
