WOMAN SUFFRAGE There is no valid reason for refusing the request of the Woman Suffrage Association that which they ask of the New Brunswick legislature. It is a moderate request, asking only that the present municipal franchise for widows and spinners, based on property and income, be made a provincial franchise.

IN ITS TRUE COLOR Even the Standard declares that the five dollar poll tax cannot stand. Yet the plant government majority at Fredericton yesterday forced this tax upon the men in St. John, who earn \$300 or less.

But the government made another false bill for the special purpose of legislating Factory Inspector McMulkin out of office. As soon as the Hazen government went into power it was gleefully announced among Conservatives that Mr. McMulkin's job was a liberal one.

A PARTISAN MOVE The Fredericton Herald makes some interesting statements relative to the Hazen government's attempt to make Conservative gains by the re-annexation of Westmorland county.

According to the last census the population of Westmorland county is 42,000, while that of Moncton is placed at 9,226. In 1871 the population of Westmorland county was 29,335. Moncton in the same census is credited with a population of 600.

Moncton, and while no accurate figures are obtainable as to the growth of Moncton since the last census it is admitted that the ratio of growth still holds good, while there is fairly reliable authority that the present population is not far from 12,000.

At a recent meeting of the board of health it was decided to have section 46 of the public health act printed and sent to all school teachers in the health district. Under the requirements of this section it is the duty of the teacher, if he suspects that any of the pupils has come from a house in which there is any infectious disease, to instantly dismiss the school and notify the board of school trustees.

The Chatham World (Conservative) denounces the salary grab. It says:—"We used to call it 'Salary Grab' when, under the late government, persons in power took advantage of their positions to pocket public money under form of law, and we call it Salary Grab when one of the present guardians of the treasury gets his hands into the public chest for his own profit.

The Standard aggravates the offence of deliberately garbling the statement of Hon. Mr. Fielding respecting Mr. G. S. Mayes by coolly attempting to justify the act.


