J. P. CLAYTON'S SON DROWNED

Falling from Travis' bridge into the Marsh Creek last evening, little Donald Clayton, eight-year-old son of J. P. Clayton, superintendent of Fernald Cemetery, lost his life by drowning. Mr. and Mrs. Clayton were at a theatre in the city when notified of the fatality. Kenneth Hunter, another lad living nearby, had seen little Donald fishing from the bridge, but a few minutes later, on approaching saw only his cap and fishing rod on the water. He at once gave the alarm, and soon many were searching for the body. It was recovered by John O'Leary and F. McCabe, using the city grappling iron.

Besides his parents, the drowned boy is survived by five brothers, James R. of this city; Joshua S. and Ernest R. with the 6th Mounted Rifles at Valcartier; Roy and Andrew at home, and three sisters, Mrs. George Pope, Mrs. John Day, and Miss Myrtle, at home.
