JACK O'BRIEN, OF MOVIES FAME, VISITING CITY

Leading Man Enthuses Over
Rich Scenery of New
Brunswick

SEES FIELD HERE
FOR SCREEN TALES

Says U. S. Producers Turn-
ing Their Eyes Towards
Canada

New Brunswick's magnificent scenery has won another enthusiastic visitor in the person of Jack O'Brien, brother of Eugene O'Brien and himself a well-known motion picture actor who arrived in the city today on a motor trip through the Maritime Provinces. Mr. O'Brien flew by airplane from Mitchell Field, New York to Old Orchard, Maine, and from there he motored through Maine to Woodstock and down the valley of the Saint John to this city. Mr. O'Brien said this morning he was impressed with the scenery and with the hospitality accorded him. Although on a holiday trip, Mr. O'Brien is on the lookout for stories and reports regarding the scenic beauty of the Maritimes to take back to the scenario writers.

16 YEARS WITH CAMERA.

Mr. O'Brien, although still a young man, is a veteran in the motion picture game, having entered it 16 years ago when just a lad. He has been leading man for Norman Shearer, the Montreal girl, in "The Stealers," Maurice Clark, Hope Hampton, Edith Roberts, Carmel Myers and Anna Q. Nilsson. He holds the honor of having produced the first picture made in Alaska, "The Lure of the Yukon," in which Eva Novak starred. Mr. O'Brien has done considerable work in serials and westerns and was starred in "Bride 19" a serial made during the war. He had a prominent part in "The Iron Horse" and his latest appearance was in "Once Upon a Time." He is due back in Hollywood, California, by January 1 when he will commence work on a new picture.

LOOK TO CANADA.

In conversation with Mr. O'Brien, he revealed the interesting fact that American producers looking toward Canada for new material for stories. If Canada, he said, could bring freshness to the screen in treatment and stories, it would be well worth while because pictures made in foreign lands were in vogue in the United States now. From what he had seen of New Brunswick, he was convinced that something was being done in historical type could be developed successfully.

Mr. O'Brien was much interested to learn that Louis B. Mayer, prominent producer, and Walter Riggdon, well-known actor, were in Saint John. He said it was possible that Mr. O'Brien will address a local gathering on motion pictures on his return if it can be arranged. This morning he was being shown about town by Mr. Fielding, manager of the Unique Theatre.

DEER HUNT SEASON OPENS TOMORROW

Good Months Ahead For Sports-
men in New Brunswick
Woods is Outlook

The hunting season for deer in the Province of New Brunswick will open tomorrow. The Department of Lands and Mines this year adopted the policy of distributing game licenses several days before the opening in order that vendors would have the opportunity of issuing the licenses before the opening of the season and thus permit sportsmen to get a start at the very opening. Chief Game Warden L. A. Gagon, sent out the licenses on the 10th.

DEER AND DUCK PLENTIFUL.

Advance reports are that deer and duck are plentiful. The districts frequented by them have had them in large numbers. Moose also are reported to be as numerous as usual and a good moose-hunting season is the expectation. The season for moose opens on Oct. 1.

CLOSE SEASON ON PARTRIDGE.

There is a close season on partridge. The Department is taking precautions to enforce the regulations against the killing of that game bird rigidly and having partridges in possession is an offense as well as the killing of them.

SEE THE FALLS

At high tide the water of the Bay of Fundy reaches a higher level than the water of the Saint John River and forces its way through the gorge of the Falls, creating a "fall" running up river. At low tide the water in the Bay becomes so much lower than that of the river, that the fall of water is reversed and flows down river into the mouth of the Bay. At half tide, when the level in the Bay and river are about equal, the water at the Falls becomes smooth as the surface of a lake. It is fully appreciated this wonder of the world it should be seen at all three stages.
