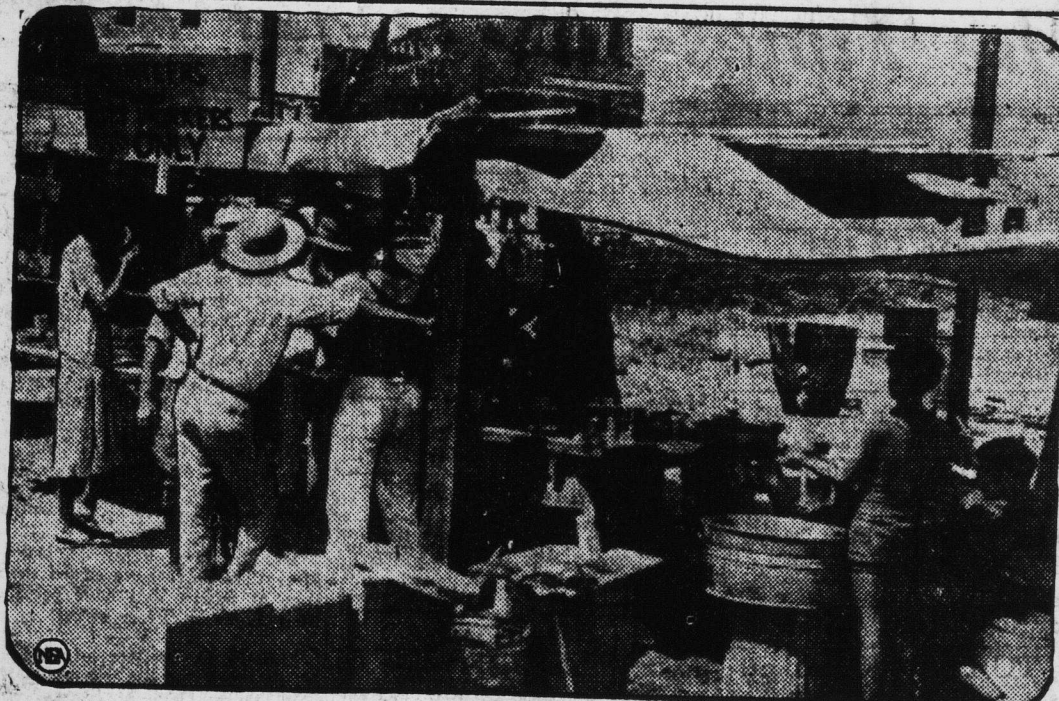

has increased 20 per cent. over the like period last year.

In the circumstances, says the report, "we cannot escape the conclusion that the Volstead Act has failed utterly to do what it was intended to do, namely, promote temperance and sobriety."

"Moreover," the statement finds, "since conditions have become worse, not better, each year, and with the 'next generation' drinking as never before, there seems to be no hope that the Volstead Act, in its present drastic form, can ever accomplish its purpose."

REFERS TO CANADA.

"From the experience, before national prohibition, of the states which had restricted laws, from the experience of the whole country during the restricted years 1918-1919, and from the experience of the Canadian provinces and the Scandinavian countries, we believe that a greater degree of temperance can be obtained by a wide restrictive law than by a bone-dry law which does not command the respect of a large part of the people."

WHEELER ANSWERS

WASHINGTON, Sept. 29.—Wayne B. Wheeler, of the Anti-Saloon League, described the Moderation League's "second annual report against prohibition" as being "a foundationless as the first one."

"It juggles figures," Mr. Wheeler said, "by ignoring increased population, failing to compare conditions now with licensed days, and failing to take into account greater activity in arresting intoxicated persons."

"Of course, there are more drunken auto drivers arrested now than formerly because we now have over 20,000,000 automobiles compared with a few thousand of some years ago. The lie about increased drunkenness among youth was nailed by the report survey made by 'The Literary Digest.'"

"If the dry states were half as bad off as this report claims, the voters in these states would not continue to send solid delegations to Congress to strengthen national prohibition and elect state legislators and public officials to uphold and enforce their state prohibition laws."

BOSTON, Sept. 30.—Albert E. Warburton, 34, a prominent insurance counselor, with office at 80 Congress street, Boston, met death in a plunge from the roof of his home to the sidewalk, in Belmont, when he lost his footing while installing a radio antenna.

The police were called to the home, at 85 Leavitt street, and took him to the Cambridge Hospital, where it was found that he had died of a broken neck. Mr. Warburton is survived by his wife, who became the mother of a baby three weeks ago. The family formerly lived in Dorchester.

More Than \$7,000 in Various
Forms Scattered
Through House
