DETAILED NEAR MATTAWAMKEG.
A derailment occurred on the C. P. R. line west of Mattawamkeg last night, when cars in a freight train bound east, jumped the rails. Fortunately no one was injured, but the line was blocked for some time. As a result No. 39, which left here last night for Montreal, and No. 40, which arrived in the city this morning from Montreal had to delay their trip from Mattawamkeg to Brownville. Later reports were that the line was cleared and trains again running.

LIKELY CONTINUE FOR ANOTHER DAY.
Undiminished Rush Greeted Opening of Third Day of Tuberculosis Case-finding Campaign.

The case-finding campaign of the St. John Society for the Prevention of Tuberculosis was continued this morning, with just as many applicants for examination as on the previous days. It was almost definitely decided that, instead of ending tonight, the campaign would be continued tomorrow. To this end, arrangements are being made today to have the specialists who are here from outside points remain for another twenty-four hours.
This morning there were about the same number of examinations made as on the last two days and with about the same results, so Miss Inglis, nurse expert in charge, said this afternoon.

R. A. ROSS HAS 14 QUESTIONS

Will be Presented to Hydro Commission With Proposed Offer.

Mayor Makes Announcement
—Prospect of a Revival of Industry—Cranston Avenue Sewer Application—Gasoline Station for Douglas Avenue.

R. A. Ross, engineer, of Montreal, who has been engaged by the city to advise on the matter of the proposed contract with the New Brunswick Electric Power Commission regarding the distribution of the hydro current from Musquash, will make a bid to sit beside ex-President Woodrow Wilson in the hall of fame. When the late head of the republic to the south of us was in attendance at the Versailles peace conference, he earned undying notoriety with his "fourteen points." Mr. Ross has followed in this gentleman's noted footsteps and when the proposed new offer of the city is presented to the power commission, there will also be presented with it a list of fourteen questions, propounded by Mr. Ross, and which the commission will be expected to answer for the information and guidance of the St. John electors. Such was the announcement made by Mayor Schofield at a committee meeting of the common council this morning.

City Property Matters.

An application for the purchase of lot 180 at the corner of Mecklenburg and Pitt streets, was made by George Reinhart, to whom it is at present leased for \$25 a year. The matter was referred to Commissioner Bullock for report. To him was also referred an application of J. Fred Sullivan for renewal of a lease for a lot at the corner of Leinster and Crown streets.

J. V. Cassidy applied on behalf of himself and Charles Kane for rental of the second flat in the McLeod building in Water street for the purpose of operating a factory for the manufacture of mattresses and springs. An offer of \$20 a month was made with the prospect of a lease later if the business was successful. Mr. Bullock, to whom the matter was referred, said that the flat in question was now occupied by the memorial shops, but the top flat of the building could be made available for the shops if the factory proposition materialized.

Commissioner Jones presented a report of the city engineer on a petition of residents of Cranston avenue for a sewer into the head waters of Newman Brook. The engineer expressed the opinion that a trunk sewer would be impossible at the present time on account of the grades in the present line of the avenue. He suggested that the residents construct a private sewer, which could be connected with a city sewer which could be constructed after the grading of the avenue to its proper level.

The commissioner said that about fourteen families were interested. It was decided to inform the petitioners of the engineer's report in the matter. In the meantime the mayor suggested a personal visit by the commissioners and himself to the scene, and this was arranged for 2:30 this afternoon.

Hydro Matters.
The mayor reported that the bill regarding the N. B. Power Co. was introduced in the house at Fredericton last night and will be brought before the municipal bills committee next Tuesday. It is understood that some of the representatives of the power company stockholders will be present from Boston on Tuesday.

The mayor said that R. A. Ross and himself were unable to see Dr. E. A. Smith, chairman of the New Brunswick Electric Power Commission while in Fredericton, but Mr. Ross had prepared a list of fourteen questions to be presented to the power commission when the proposed new offer of the city was made.

GREAT GAIN IN CUSTOMS RETURNS

Port of St. John Shows an Increase of More Than \$2,000,000 Over the Previous Year.

The customs returns for the Port of St. John for the fiscal year ended on March 31 were made public this morning and show a gratifying increase over last year. The figures, by months, are as follows:—

The figures show that in the first part of 1920-21 the receipts were larger than in the first part of 1921-22, but the gain in the latter part of the last year more than offset this, there being a steady gain in the last few months. C. B. Lockhart, collector of customs, said this morning that while a large part of the increased receipts came from larger importations of sugar, yet he was convinced that all kinds of trade did their share.
