





Ottawa, May 29-(Canadian Press)-Percentage of gold held against do-minion notes outstanding on, April 30, shows a slight decrease as compared shows a slight decrease as compared with the previous month. On April 30, dominion notes in circulation amounted to \$242,466,543, and gold held for re-demption, \$81,471,768, or 33.11 per cent. Approved securities also on deposit against the notes amounted to \$124,258,-645. On March 31, dominion notes in circulation totalled \$241,461,426; gold held \$80,884,458 or 33.42 per cent.
