TO TEACH RURAL RECREATION AT THE SUMMER SCHOOL

A. C. Gorham, director of agricultural education in the province, who is in the city attending the Teachers' Institute, said yesterday that the teachers' summer school in rural science, which is to be held at Sussex this year, as is customary, has this year an exceptionally large enrollment. The capacity of the camp is already spoken for, but special arrangements can be made to accommodate any late-comers. The enrollment of young men teachers is greater in proportion than in any other year. The portion is to open in Sussex on July 11 and close on Aug. 8 and every arrangement had been made to give the teachers an opportunity for recreation while taking rural science studies. A programme of sports has been drawn up and it is expected that the swimming hole and volley ball courts will be as popular as ever.

A new course has been introduced into this year's programme for the summer school, that of rural recreation. The new subject will deal with games, community singing, folk dancing and similar forms of recreation. Miss Mary Jamieson, of Edgill School, Windsor, is to give this instruction, which she is well qualified to do, having had considerable experience in nature study camps and institutions.
