Halifax, N. S., May 24.—A meeting of the creditors of the National Fish Company was held in the office of Hon. G. S. Faulkner, official trustee under the Bankruptcy Act, yesterday afternoon, at which their various claims against the assets of the company were proved.

A scheme of arrangement was drawn up, providing for the securing of these claims, the issue of new stock, the appointment of new directors, and other plans for carrying on the business.

## LYNCH SUSPENDED

New York, May 24.—Suspension of Joe Lynch, heavyweight champion, was announced tonight by the New York state boxing commission. The commission announced that Lynch and his manager, Eddie Meade, had been suspended pending further action by the Massachusetts state board of boxing which previously had suspended them on a charge of violating a contract to box at Holyoke (Mass.) April 29.

Three pugilists, receiving thirty-day suspensions by the commission because they had been disqualified for committing fouls, were Edward Baird of Seattle, Billy DeLoe of St. Paul and Mike McTigue of New York.

## NAVY PAYMASTER IS INDICTED

Ensign Lyman, Who Flew to Montreal, Charged With Embezzlement of \$21,000.

Boston, May 24.—An indictment charging Ensign Joe J. Lyman, former paymaster of the U. S. S. Chester, with embezzlement of \$21,419, was returned yesterday by the federal grand jury.

Lyman fled to Montreal, but returned and surrendered to federal authorities, saying the money had been stolen from him.

## CUNARDER HELD UP BY COAL DIFFICULTY

Southampton, May 25.—The Cunard steamer Mauretania, scheduled to sail Saturday, will delay her departure until the following week, according to an official statement made by the company. The delay is due to difficulty in obtaining necessary coal.
