

GYPSY CHIEF HAS PLAN TO RE-UNITE THE RACE

Toledo, Sept. 14.—The gypsy chief, Juan Sanchez Vargas, has started a campaign with the purpose of re-uniting the gypsy race, which has spread throughout the world. He proposes instituting a system of civic and religious education; and thereafter, if possible, to gather together the entire race and establish a communal life where the gypsies can formulate their own laws. The first step to be taken in this direction will be the calling of a conference of delegates of gypsies from all nations.

THE STANDARD AND LIBERAL VOTERS

That Liberal support might be enlisted for Hon. Mr. Wigmore, the Standard and Conservative leaders hereabouts have played largely upon the local aspect in the present by-election. In its excitement, however, with sudden realization that the situation is not as rosy as at first glimpse, the silken glove of fraternity falls off and in real Tory fashion the Conservative organ attacks Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King.

The favorite stereotype falsehood regarding the Liberal leader's war record is repeated. It does not become necessary to reply to the Standard's harrangue, as Hon. Mr. King in parliament and out of it has effectually and in a manner satisfactory to all fair-minded people, answered this insulting tirade.

The point to be made is, only, that Liberals that might have been deceived or are likely to be, have either to approve of this sort of thing or to disapprove. To adopt the former course is to vote for the candidate of the Tory-Meighen government. To take the only honorable course is to place themselves behind their leader and vote for Dr. Emery on the 20th.

Mr. Wigmore has announced that he will, during this campaign, discuss the policy of his party. This course is to be welcomed as the issue is put up squarely and those supporting Hon. Mr. Meighen and Hon. Mr. King will be in a position to align themselves accordingly.

That the record might be kept straight the truthfulness of the Standard can best be judged by a rather illuminating exhibit. Soliciting advertising for that journal it solemnly announced to an official of the Liberal executive that it was an independent newspaper. The Standard will be measured in its own bushel.

COWS HOLDS UP FOUR TRAINS IN MASSACHUSETTS

Braintree, Mass., Sept. 14.—A bold, bold band of a "moody" cow held up four trains on the New Haven Railroad and gave Chief of Police Jerry Gallivan a long, cross-country run before the "red terror" was safe in custody.

The chief was called to Washington Park by indignant residents, who saw the crops of the carefully tended gardens going rapidly to ruin beneath the onslaughts of this roving cow. When Chief Gallivan got to Washington Park he was unable to find any trace of the cow but did see a trail of ruined gardens. While investigating the course of the hoof prints, the chief heard a train come to a sudden stop amid the shrieking of locomotive whistles. Running down the side of the wooded hill opposite Washington Park the chief saw the cow on the tracks in front of the engine.

Assisted by some boys who asked no better fun than to act under official orders in chasing the cow, the party made a flanking movement but the cow saw the crowd of pursuers first and ran across the marsh lands to the Granite Branch railroad, climbed up the bank to the tracks on this branch road just as the West Quincey train was coming along and this train, too, was brought to a stop by a watchful engineer.

In trying to dodge the pursuers, the cow doubled back on her tracks and finally landed on the main line again near the Quincy line. The engineer of a train that was coming up the steep grade from Quincy Adams saw the cow on the rails ahead of him and he, too, remembered the "safety first" slogan and stopped the train.

Just then Chief Gallivan and his army of boys broke through the bushes alongside the track almost breathless and nearly exhausted. The cow, however, refused to wait for the pursuers, but started up the track toward Capen's Bridge. Just under the bridge a down train engineer saw the animal and he slowed down his train.

The cow, bewildered by the train coming directly toward it and the yelling crowd behind, came to a standstill. This gave Chief Gallivan a chance to catch the animal and word was sent to the other trains.

Clarence R. Bestick, the pound keeper to come and get the rover, which he did. The "outlaw" cow is now in the pound waiting an owner.

ASTOUNDING FIGURES OF FRENCH GAMBLING

Paris, Sept. 14.—The astounding figures revealing the extent of the gambling orgies at Deauville are available from the representatives of the race track and the casino. The total receipts of the pari-mutuel machines, through which the race track betting was done, are \$6,000,000, showing that more than \$65,000,000 was wagered during the few days of the racing. The profits of the casino for the season were five million dollars, indicating that a total of \$100,000,000 crossed the baccarat tables, the rake-off for the house being five per cent.

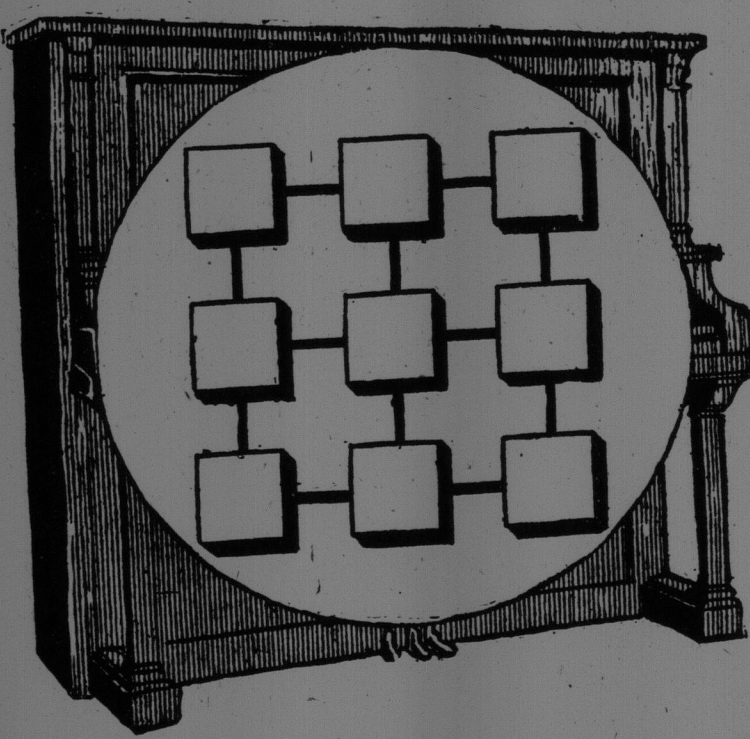
