

\$25,000 Worth of Jewelry Belonging to Her Son.

GREEK KING DEAD

Attack of Pet Monkey.

(Associated Press Despatch.) Athens, Oct. 25—King Alexander of Greece died this evening at 5.20. His death was due to wounds which he had received in an attack on him by a pet monkey early in October, the king being badly mutilated.

Alexander succeeded to the throne of Greece in June, 1917, when his father, King Constantine, abdicated in response to the demand of France, Great Britain and Russia, the three powers which had guaranteed the constitutional liberties of the Greek people. Alexander was the second son of Constantine and at the time of his accession was not quite twenty-four years old. His elder brother, Crown Prince George, was considered ineligible for the throne because of alleged pro-German sympathies.

The death occurred in St. John last week of George W. Dunbar of Pennfield, Charlotte county. The deceased was in his fortieth year. He leaves his parents, one sister and four brothers. The funeral took place at Pennfield on Saturday and was very largely attended.
