**Today's Ottawa List Includes Names of Soldiers From St. John**

Ottawa, Aug. 30.—There were 471 casualties in today's list, of which eighty-six were killed in action, twenty-two died of wounds, eight died, twenty-five presumed to have died, four wounded and missing, one missing believed killed, twenty-nine missing, fifteen ill, 227 wounded, fifty-one gassed and two prisoners of war. **WAR NEWS OVER STOCK BROKERS' WIRE.**  
(J. M. Robinson & Sons' Private Wire Telegram.)  
New York, Aug. 30.—Great German losses in prisoners, guns and material reported in British night bulletin from battlefield.

**CORN AND OATS.**  
Chicago, Aug. 30.—In the absence of selling sentiment profit-taking by shorts ran the price of corn up momentarily at the opening of the market today, but in half an hour the price was backed around yesterday's close. October opened 1/4 cents lower to 1/2 cents higher at 1.55 to 1.54 1/2, touching 1.55 1/2 and then reacted to 1.54 1/2. Feeling was nervous and fluctuations were jerky.  
The oats market opened dull and slightly higher, with corn. October opened unchanged to 1/2 cent lower at 71 1/2 to 71 1/2, sold to 72, and reacted to 71 1/2 to 71 1/2.  
Provisions were inactive and nominally unchanged.

**CARLETON STREET CAR SERVICE IS GIVEN AN AIRING**

**Commissioners Decided to Apply to Utilities Commission MR. HILYARD FOR FIGHT**

**Says It Is Time To Take Bit in Teeth—Tenders for Sand Point Work; Matter of Pleasant Point Ferry Bonus**

At a committee meeting of the common council this morning tenders were opened for a platform in No. 1 shed and for runways in 3, 4 and 5 sheds in West St. John. Edward A. Farren and Grant & Horne were the only tenderers. The tenders for the platform were: Edward A. Farren, \$2,900; Grant & Horne, \$4,100; for the runways, Edward A. Farren, \$1,248.50; Grant & Horne, \$1,900. The tenders were referred to Commissioner Bullock and the mayor.

Commissioner Bullock spoke about the condition of the piling at the east side ferry floats and moved that he be authorized to call for tenders for the construction of a brace of piling on the north side of these floats. The motion was carried. It came out that the city is encroaching on W. H. Thorne & Co's property at one end of the float and that the company is encroaching on the city property at another point. A line will in all probability be established.

Commissioner Bullock reported that he had interviewed the city recorder regarding the city position. He desired to grant a bonus towards the maintenance of the Indiantown-Pleasant Point ferry service. He said that the recorder declared it would be perfectly legal for the city to pay such a bonus. The city has been asked to pay \$82.50 a month for the maintenance of the service, the Lancaster Commission to pay the same amount, the said sum to be paid not beyond May, 1919.

**Carleton Street Cars.**  
The question of the street car service and the ferry boat was then brought up by Commissioner Bullock. He said he had been endeavoring to come to an understanding with the railway officials to get them to resume their former service of meeting the ferry. This, he said, he failed to do and as a result moved that the matter be given to the Public Utilities Commission. This was seconded by Commissioner Fisher and passed.

Commissioner Hilyard asked if the old route on some streets in West St. John could not be torn up as they were not being used. Commissioner Fisher said he thought they had that power. Mr. Hilyard said that the street railway were never willing to concede a point, so it was time to take the bit in their teeth and fight them tooth and nail. He said the sooner the better.

A five years renewal at \$150 rental was granted to the Dominion Government Fish Hatchery on the Loch Lomond road.

Commissioner Fisher brought up the question of the proposed city playground on some streets in Rockwood Park. He said that it would require an expenditure of approximately \$1,000 to get the first four acres in shape, providing that material for filling in a portion of a creek could be procured free. He read a recommendation of Road Engineer Hatfield who said that he felt it would be a good thing to have the grounds turned into a dump for a period in order to fill in the creek section.

The other commissioners seemed unanimous in the opinion that if the permission of the park authorities could be had it would be a good idea to open it up for dumping purposes.

**LIEUTENANT J. H. A. L. FAIRWEATHER REPORTED AMONG THE WOUNDED**

**No Particulars in Telegram Received Today—Pte. H. Nichols, Receives Gunshot Wound**

A telegram from Ottawa to members of his family today announces that Lieut. J. H. A. L. Fairweather has been wounded. The telegram gave no particulars as to the nature of his wound. Lieutenant Fairweather for some time past has been in command of a heavy battery of Canadian artillery. He has a host of friends in this city and province who will hear the news with keen regret and who will hope that the wound is not serious.

Mrs. Christopher Nichols of 11 Mill street was advised this morning that her step-son, Private Henry Nichols, a member of an infantry battalion, had been wounded with gunshot and admitted to a casualty clearing station in France. His twenty-four years and prior to going overseas was working in Ontario.

**Corporal R. J. Long**  
B. Long of Milford received news on Monday that Corp. Robert J. Long had been admitted to 49 Casualty Clearing Station on Aug. 29, suffering from gunshot wound. Corp. Long enlisted in the 64th Battalion, but has been with another in the fighting. He is twenty years old. It will be three years in October since he enlisted. He also has another brother, the only one, in the 2nd Battalion Canadian Railway Troops, France.
