DOCTOR HELD CRIMINALLY RESPONSIBLE FOR DEATH

Mather, Man., Nov. 7.—Dr. Eakine, of Sarnia, North Dakota was held criminally responsible for the death of Mrs. W. McLeod, of this place, by a jury empaneled at Dilos Mound. MAKING A MATCH FOR SOVEREIGN

Luxembourgers, However, Will Find Grand Duchess Marie Will Have Own Way

LONDON SOCIETY. Foolish Fashion Fad Now Makes Women Tamper With Their Eyes—Lady Craven's Political Entertainments—News of Canada latest

London, Oct. 26.—Luxembourg, the capital of the smallest kingdom in Europe of the same name and ruled over by the youngest sovereign, has turned match-maker so reports a friend who has just come from there. This little country, as you know, is now governed by the Grand Duchess Marie, a remarkably pretty eighteen-year-old girl, and, of course, having arrived at this mature age, it is time to think of finding a husband for her. This is no trifling matter, for, in spite of the diminutive size of the country, Princess Marie is almost the richest "crowned head" having a fortune of \$50,000,000 in her own right. The two names one hears most often mentioned in connection with hers are those of the Prince of Wales, and Prince Joachim, the youngest son of the German Emperor. The Kaiser, of course, would dearly like to secure this little prize for his son—and incidentally the country to add to his empire—but the young woman is a Catholic and the religion question a big one.

The talk about the Prince of Wales is, of course, ridiculous. It is quite on the cards that the good Luxembourgers' match-maker plan (some of the proverbs will "gang agley," for in the statistics of the House of Nassau, there is a clause that for the marriage of a member of the reigning house, the consent of the head of the house is necessary. Now, the head of the house is the royal Prince, and the young woman being a young woman of an extremely strong will, it is more than likely that she will do as she pleases in aid of the matter.

Princess Marie's faithful subjects represent in all about 200,000 souls, and as for her, she was army-well, it could be accomplished easily in any big hall. What worries her Royal Highness is that when she attends any function she insists on having a large escort, and with a total of but 200 subjects, she has to attend a few hundred more than she has. The grand duchess is extremely popular with her subjects. She is quite pretty to begin with, and in spite of the rather large ideas she has of her own dignity, she has a gracious "way with her" that quickly wins their hearts. And it is when her crown-made of oak, by the way—she put away on the top shelf and her state robes laid in the dresser with samphires, that she becomes an ordinary human girl, that she endears herself to them. She is a graceful and fearless rider, passionately devoted to all her horses, which she visits regularly every day with a basket of dainties—and also an expert easter.

Tamper With Eyes to Be Fashion. It is no new thing for lovely women to endure discomfort or ridicule in the pursuit of the elusive "up-to-date" idea, but to risk positive danger is a boundary of folly that she has not hitherto touched. Yet the persistence of the "odd" idea in frocks, hats and cloaks, has resulted in the eyes, and some women with more vanity than brains are now actually acquiring "odd optics."

The fashionable English woman has not gone farther than dropping bella donna into one eye, which makes it larger and brighter in appearance than the other. DAILY HINTS FOR THE COOK

WALNUT CAKE. Cream together half a cup of butter, a cup of sugar and the yolks of two eggs. Stir half a cup of cornstarch with half a cup of milk and add to the sugar and eggs. Mix one teaspoonful of baking powder with one cup of flour and stir all together, then add the whites of the eggs beaten very stiff. The last thing stir in a cup of broken walnut meats which have been floured. Flavor with almond or vanilla.

HOT CHOCOLATE PUDDING.

Two ounces of chocolate, 2 pint of milk, 1/2 pint of bread crumbs, 2 eggs, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 cup butter, 1 cup sugar, 1/2 cup raisins, 1/2 cup currants, 1/8 of nutmeg. Boil the chocolate, milk and the crumbs, let stand one-half hour and then mark fine. Beat the eggs light, add them and the melted butter, then the fruit, spice and sugar. Butter a tin basin, turn in the mixture and steam for one hour. Serve without sauce or with sweetened and flavored cream if a sauce is preferred.

NO BATH IN 22 YEARS

St. Petersburg, Nov. 6.—An old lady possessed of 1,000,000 rubles (\$200,000) has just died here from a malady due to twenty-two years' abstinence from soap and water.
