THE JESUIT ESTATES BILL

The agitation against the Jesuit Estates bill, although it has been framed down by the politicians on both sides of the House of Commons, still continues to spread, especially in the province of Quebec. It is quite clear that, unless checked in some way, a movement of this kind must eventually assume dangerous proportions, and exert the greatest influence upon both the great political parties. In the country, where so large a proportion of the population consists of Roman Catholics, it is obviously against the general interest that an agitation, based merely on religious grounds, should be carried on and made a political issue. Yet this seems to be the drift of events at the present time, mainly in consequence of the passage of an act by the Legislature of Quebec to pay the Jesuits a large sum of money in liquidation of their claims to certain estates forfeited to the crown on the dissolution of the order in Canada many years ago.

The right of the Province of Quebec to case such an act has been questioned, and, owing to this, it has been cited as a proof that the Pope claimed in Canada certain privileges and a degree of authority inconsistent with the Royal prerogative. The combination effected by the legislature of the two great parties in Parliament, for the purpose of disposing of this matter, has not succeeded in effecting the purpose intended. The agitation still goes on, and both Liberals and Conservatives can see its elements of danger. This being so, it is clear that if it can be disposed of by some Court of competent jurisdiction, a difficulty of great magnitude will be removed from the path of the politicians. The action taken by Mr. Hugh Graham of Montreal to settle the question in this way, is therefore timely, and will be best understood by a reference to the petition which he presented yesterday which is in the following terms:

THE MATRIMONY CONTEST. The Matrimony election to-day was marked by the quiet activity which usually distinguishes civic contests in St. John. As the result will be found in our late editions we shall not trouble our readers with any speculations on the subject. The great feature of the election is the grossly unfair treatment which Mr. George A. Barker has received from the Sun and from those who control that journal. This is a matter to which we will make a more extended reference on some future occasion. So far as Mr. Everett is concerned, the Gazette, at all events, has merely dealt with him as a public man, and has opposed his election on public grounds. It has admitted Mr. Everett to be a good business man, but it has declined to give him in its election as mayor of St. John.

NOTICE AND COMMENT.

The new Intercolonial time table appears to have been framed mainly in the interests of Halifax. Owing to an unreasonable extension of three hours on a quarter of a mile from the time from St. John to Halifax (Halifax to St. John) it is only 55 minutes less than it is from Halifax to Quebec. We fail to see why through passengers from St. John should be detained more than three hours at Montreal.

The Gazette yesterday published a long article from a Boston paper on the minerals of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, and the Globe published a three-quarter column editorial in favour of the minerals of the United States. This coincidence marks the contrast between the Gazette and the Globe. The object of the Gazette is to make known the resources of this country, and to cause the public to know that the minerals of the United States are not better than those of this country, and the result is an increasing circulation for the Gazette and a decreasing circulation for the Globe.

The Fredericton papers which call the citizens of St. John a very mercenary people, are now engaged in the interesting business of electing a Mayor for the next time this year. The gentleman who was elected in May is now to become a resident of St. John, a fact of which they were well aware when they elected him, but for certain reasons it was thought best to advise to take a different view which has now to be done.

The announcement that the Canadian Pacific Railway has been refused the bonding privilege by the United States government is a serious blow. But for the present, and until the news is officially confirmed, we shall leave to doubt that the Washington authorities have been guilty of such an act of folly.

In the Globe of yesterday there appears a letter from Mr. George G. Gilbert, in regard to the proceedings taken by the Bank of Nova Scotia against Mr. Barker, in which there is the following statement:
