NEWS OF THE WORLD.

Sydney, July 3.—H. M. S. Wistaria arrived here from St. John's, Nfld., to-day and her commander paid the usual official visit to Mayor Fitzgerald. The miners are apprehensive that the sailors may be used to pump the mines, as was done at the time of the great coal strike in England in 1920, when naval ratings manned the pumps of the English collieries.

Halifax, July 3.—The steamer Newton, enroute to this port, to load sugar for Montreal, is ashore on Penulous breakers just inside Lockport Lighthouse.

Halifax, July 3.—The Royal Mail steam packet liner Carazuet, which went ashore June 25th on reefs about twelve miles from Hamilton, Bermuda, will be a total loss and will be replaced on the Canadian Bermuda and West Indies route by another steamer it was stated here to-night by John Hulbert, General Agent in Canada of the Royal Mail Steam Packet Co.

Sydney, July 3.—The Portuguese schooner Santa Lucia was towed into Sydney Harbor on Saturday night by the steamer Trestleven, after a trying experience. She lost her rudder on the fishing banks and started for St. John's equipped with a jury rudder. In the fog she was twice rammed by the steamer Trestleven who finally towed her into Sydney. The owners of the Santa Lucia intend suing the Trestleven.
