### LOCAL LEGISLATURE.

**FREDERICTON, March 10.**—The house met at three o'clock. Mr. Robertson read the petition of the St. John Local Council of Women and a number of other women's associations of St. John praying that the house will take the necessary steps to provide for the criminal care of feeble minded women and children now in the Provincial Hospital. The speaker said he was not sure that the petition was in order, that it should have been addressed to the governor-in-council, but as it was not objected to he would receive it.

Mr. Tweedle presented the petition of the council of Victoria, in favor of a bill relating to the valuation of that county and also a petition to amend the statutes authorizing Victoria county to issue debentures.

Mr. Purdy presented the petition of the common council of St. John in favor of a bill relating to the appointment of assessors.

Mr. Maxwell presented the petition of the common council of St. John in favor of a bill to amend the act relating to heat, light and power.

Continuing the debate on the speech from the throne Mr. Tweedle spoke at length in defence of the government and its various policies. He dwelt especially upon the proposed utilization of water power at Grand Falls and the development of the Queens County coal mines, predicting great profit to the province from both.

The address was then carried. Mr. Hasen asked if the attorney general would be prepared to make a statement with regard to the fisheries case which was to have been placed before the supreme court in May last.

Mr. Pugsley—With regard to the fishery award claim I may say that at the session before last there was laid on the table of the house a printed pamphlet which contained the case on the part of this province. I may say also that this statement was agreed to verbally by the administrator of justice. We had no reason to doubt that he would adhere to the view he then held and we were justified in believing that the case would be submitted to the supreme court. The question was a narrow one whether the proprietary rights of the province, the shore fisheries vested in Her Majesty in right of the province or in the Dominion. The only change suggested by him was the insertion of the words "United Kingdom, and to this we agreed. Subsequently the administrator of justice changed his mind and a communication was made to us that as the Dominion government had received this money in good faith years ago and paid bounties out of it, the question should be changed so as to read whether our rights were such as could be enforced in a court of law. The minister of justice had a perfect right to change his mind, but if we had assented to his proposition we would have given our faith away for it was not based on the fact that it could be recovered in a court of law, but that the right to take fish belonged to the province, and therefore when the money was paid over it was clothed with a proprietary right. The fisheries authorities again wished to frame a new case. We wished to have the proprietary rights to the fisheries put in. We felt that we had made an impression upon the minister of justice and were afterwards informed by him that the case would be submitted to the supreme court in May. In June last before I left for England Mr. Peters of P. E. I., and myself met the deputy minister of justice and we finally agreed on the terms of the case. We understood that the matter was to be passed by the council, but when I returned in August I found it had not been passed the council, and that is the way the matter now stands. Surely we have reason to believe that it will pass the council. We have stated the facts of the case honestly and openly as they are and I cannot conceive it possible that a great and wealthy government will desire to hold on to this money unjustly or will refuse us the right to have it a question submitted to the courts. It would be a monstrous thing if this money belongs to us that we should be deprived of an opportunity of proving our right to it.

The house adjourned until 8 p. m. Monday.

**MODERN PIED PIPER.**  
(London Chronicle).  
The modern Pied Piper sits in a London office in clothes that are as immaculate as those of a fashion plate.

He of Hamelin used a wonderful pipe, and charmed the rats away to the accompaniment of the merry tune he played. His modern prototype carries his magic in a bottle.

It is a secret fluid that looks like camphorated oil and smells like anise seed. The modern Pied Piper speaks it on the ground, and where he spreads it the rats begin to go. One will follow the trail from its underground hiding place, and, having found the tasty food, flavored with the fluid, will return to fetch friends.

For two or three days the food is spread and then the whole of local ratland having tasted and become greedy and bold, a poison is mixed with the sweet flavored bait. Again the rats eat—this time their last meal, for they run for a few yards and drop dead, their bodies soon becoming mummified by another secret chemical.

The Pied Piper is an engineer by profession, but just now in the intervals of scientific rat-catching, he is the managing director of a well known city company. He has 23 methods of exterminating rats, that explained the success of his business.

Like a practical general he studies the country before he wages war. His surveyor is sent, first of all to investigate, and if possible the number of rats in a cellar or ship, to discover where they make their homes, and to decide upon the hour when most rats are abroad.

The fluid is made to work, for the fluid is the basis of all their methods. Sometimes the rats are attracted by the smell into a room where half a stupefied, they are put into a sack by the inventor, who, his immaculate clothes dotted for a while, is wearing thick gloves being saturated and a thick muffer, the latter to protect his throat. Sometimes they are drawn from a farmer's barn or stack into a field, where they are clubbed to death with hockey sticks.

The Pied Piper does not expect the story of his cleverness to be believed without proof. Wishing then to test his powers tested, he desires that some reader of the Daily Chronicle, whose premises are infested with vermin shall receive relief free of charge. He only stipulates that the job shall be a difficult one, and that the rats shall be numerous.

Among the recent cases in which the rat catcher has been employed are those of a hat shop in the city, where rats sometimes did damage to the extent of £10 in one night, and a restaurant not 500 yards from St. Paul's, where, in an underground dining room, daring rodents had been set to jump upon the tables while customers were eating. In each of these premises there were thousands of rats a few weeks ago. Scarcely one has been seen since the Pied Piper started work.
