STAR WANT ADS. BRING RESULTS

Synopsis of Canadian North-west Land Regulations

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him, or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing 722 1/2 pre-empted a quarter-section along his homestead. Price \$200 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead money) and cultivate fifty acres.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$200 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$500.00.

WILL WEED THEM OUT.

CHICAGO, Sept. 8.—The Record Herald today asserts that according to reports from a reliable source Dr. George E. Herman, president of the Central A. A. U., is starting an investigation of charge which, if proved, will result in a wholesale declaration of professionalism, including Matt McGrath of the New York A. C., Martin Sheridan of the Irish-American Club of New York, and members of the local Gaelic Association. The charges are to the effect that of the \$7,000 which was taken in at the meet at Gaelic Park last Sunday, McGrath and Sheridan each received \$500 in addition to their expenses.
