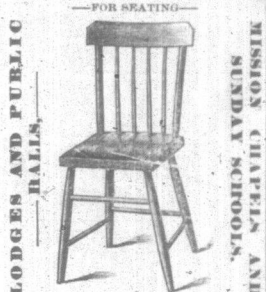

News Summary.

DOMINION. - About 21,000 live lobsters were the other day shipped from Digby to Boston.

- Mr. Wilnot arrived at Digby, N. S., last week, with 4,000 salmon to stock the lakes in Digby county.

- The stone shipment from Sackville this summer is expected to be very heavy. About 25,000 tons will be shipped by the New York-Freestone Co.

- There are now estimated to be over one hundred millions of lumber in the Fredericton booms. There never was such a large quantity there before at one time.

- Says the Sentinel: The catch of sardine herring, of a size suitable to pack for first class goods, continues small, and there is some talk of closing the factories for a time.

- An agricultural implement factory for Thomason is talked of. The men who proposed to start this enterprise, are now manufacturing some of the best threshing machines in use.

- Halifax customs receipts in May amounted to \$141,854, a decrease of \$11,040 compared with May last year.

- By the recent enlargement of 20x10 feet, the factory, Robb's, Curry & Co., of Amherst, has a floor surface of 9,580 feet. This is now the largest factory in the Maritime Provinces.

- A large number of American seiners are on our eastern coast. It is hoped that our cruisers will be there in time to prevent the driving of the mackerel out of the bay. - Amherst Record.

- Lieut. Governor J. S. Carvell, of P. E. I., is at Asheville, South Carolina, on the Great Book Island R. R. route. His honor has been very much benefited by the change, and is said to be enjoying very good health.

- The Annapolis Spectator says that the lead found at Caledonia by Dr. S. P. Frisbon some twenty years ago, was lately being more fully explored by other parties and turns out to be one of the richest in Nova Scotia.

- The recent coal discovery at the foot of the North Mountain, near Spa Springs, N. S., called the Albert coal field, about to be developed. Good specimens of iron ore have also been found in the immediate vicinity.

- The Ontario election returns show Mowat's majority to be at least 29, and it may reach 34. It was a great victory for the little premier as against the Protestant cry raised by the Empire and the Blood of the party," say Mowat's supporters.

- The house and barn of John Banks, Meadowvale, N. S., was burned to the ground on Saturday night, May 31st, at 12 o'clock. Two valuable horses, one Jersey cow and calf, together with all the farming implements, totally consumed. Loss \$2,000; no insurance.

- The debt of Canada decreased \$175,000 during last week. The revenue for the eleven months just ended shows an increase of \$1,500,000 as compared with the same period of the last fiscal year, and the expenditure a decrease nearly a million. The surplus on June 1st was over seven millions.

- A drowning accident occurred at Grand Falls last week. Two men who were crossing the river in a canoe above the falls drifted farther down than they were aware of, and were caught by the strong current and carried over the falls.

- Not a sign of the men or canoe has since been seen. A similar accident occurred once before in the history of the province.

- The heavy rain storms which prevailed in Ontario for the past few days have caused floods in various parts of the province. There is much delay to railway traffic on account of the washouts and many bridges and factories situated on the banks of the creeks and small rivers have been carried away and totally wrecked; live stock has also suffered severely.

- The bill passed by the Manitoba legislature to abolish separate schools was declared to go into effect on 1st May, but the Winnipeg Free Press says that the separate schools are still being conducted, as at numerous as ever and more largely attended. It appears that the abolition law is believed to be ultra vires of the legislature, and cannot be enforced. - Telegraph.

- Subr. Frank W. reports an exciting experience on her last trip from Moncton to Digby. About midnight off Quaco a large whale passed several times under the vessel's stern, causing her to surge as though struck by a heavy sea. The last time the whale thumped heavily against the vessel, lifting her several feet, but was finally driven off on twice receiving the contents of a gun.

- Who can estimate the good accomplished and yet to result from the \$55,000 already distributed to widows and orphan children in Canada by the Dominion Safety Fund Life Association, St. John, N. B.? It has preserved the enjoyment of home comforts and furnished the means of education in many cases where desolation and uncertainty would otherwise have been. Who has the penetration to determine what they may imply?

- The depositors in the Post Office Savings Bank of Canada, for the month of April, were \$498,428, while the withdrawals for the month were \$860,009, being \$371,581 in excess of the deposits. The total balance on 30th April was \$21,549,080. This added to the sum of \$18,695,065, the balance on deposit in the Government Savings Bank on 30th of April last, makes the total amount of savings deposited with the government on that day \$40,244,145, compared with \$40,804,700 on 31st March last and \$41,499,382, on 30th April, 1889.

- St. John is to be well supplied with electricity. It is understood the City Railway Company purpose establishing, in connection with their electric power system, an Edison incandescent light system. This is the most perfect system and also incandescent lighting yet invented; and it has been found that when this combination of electric railway and electric lighting has been made that every section has been given and the best results have been obtained at the lowest rates. The Street Railway Company will have every facility to successfully carry on the work of incandescent lighting.

British and Foreign.

- In the Commons, Thursday, the bill for the construction of the tunnel under the English Channel from England to France was rejected by a vote of 234 to 153.

- Within a few weeks the British Museum has become possessed of a Chinese bank note issued from the imperial mint 300 years before the circulation of the first paper money in Europe, or in the first year, or one of the first years, of the reign of the first Ming Emperor. The first real bank in Europe was that of Barcelona, established in 1401.

- Great preparations are being made in Mayence to celebrate the 450th anniversary of the invention of the art of printing. On June 22nd there will be an exhibition of the art of printing from the days of Gutenberg down to the present time. On June 24th, the maitray of Gutenberg, the Gutenberg Platz and the monument erected to him will be brilliantly illuminated.

- Queretaro, Mexico, is in a state of great excitement over the conflict between Protestants and Catholics. A Catholic priest, some months ago, was sent to jail at the instance of Protestants, for an overt act. Last Sunday his friends threatened violence to the judge, whereupon several of the leaders were arrested. This action excited the Catholics to such an extent that the entire police had to be called out to protect the residences and churches of the Protestants. A conflict took place between the troops and Catholics, and a number of the latter were wounded and arrested.
