

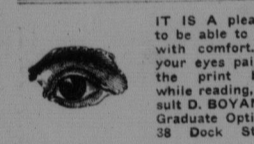

BOSTON LETTER

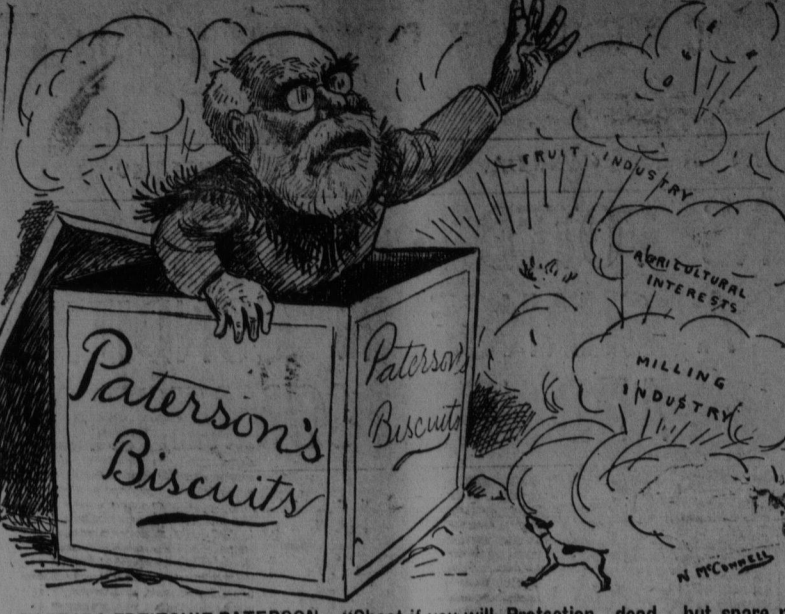

Nova Scotia Business Men Refuse To Believe That There Will Be General Strike Of Coal Miners.

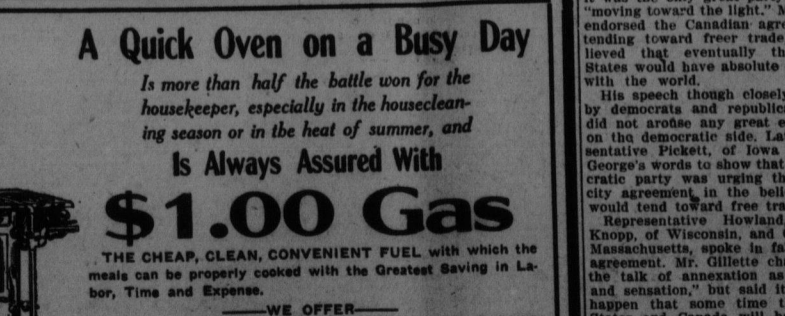

TRAGEDY OF THE NORTH

Inspector Fitzgerald And His Comrades Of The Mounted Police Perished Almost In Sight Of Their Goal.

Ottawa, April 18.—News of the finding of the bodies of Inspector (not Captain) F. J. Fitzgerald and Constables Carter, Kinney and Taylor of the mounted police, near Fort McPherson was received here today by Lt. Col. White, controller of the R. N. W. M. P., who characterized the tragedy as the worst in the history of the famous force. A particularly sad feature of it is that the four men were chosen as the mounted police contingent for the coronation.

McFarland did the leading throughout the fight, and gave an exhibition of foot work and blocking, which brought rounds of applause from the big crowd. In the fifth he began to force the fighting in earnest. With a right and left jolt to the face he sent Murphy to the ropes and followed his advantage with another dose of the same medicine.

Inspector Fitzgerald took part in the South African war in 1900, being a member of one of the cavalry contingents recruited in the Canadian north-west. He had served in the Hirschel Island station of the North-west Mounted Police, on the coast of the Arctic ocean, and he it was who broke the trail to Dawson overland by the Edmonton route.

Inspector Fitzgerald was still a young man, his forty-first birthday occurring in this present month. He joined the force at the age of 22, and had seen service in the most remote regions of this continent.

SULTAN'S TROOPS ROUT THE REBELS

Forty Tribesmen Killed And Many Wounded In Skirmish Near City Of Fez—Situation Very Disquieting.

Fez Morocco, April 18.—Captain Bremont, commander of the Sultan's troops, made an attack on April 13 on Cherada tribesmen, completely routing them, after killing forty and making many prisoners. Couriers are having the greatest difficulty in getting through the lines with despatches. One was captured by the rebels and shot.

MUST BEHAVE OR GET OUT

Aliens Seeking Refuge In Britain Must Give Bonds For Five Years' Good Behaviour If This Bill Passes.

London, April 18.—Mr. Chamberlain introduced in the House of Commons today, an amendment to the aliens bill, which, if enacted, will markedly change the attitude of the government towards those who have sought British shores as political or criminal refugees.
