The third goal was scored for Kings by George Harley, who made a brilliant rush from point and passing the puck to McGibbon before he carried the rubber almost into the visitor's net. He was rewarded with a roar of applause by the Kings College excited fans.

The half closed with Kings 4 in the lead and U. N. B. carrying the scoreless. A few slight accidents delayed the game in this half and one or two penalties were handed out to players on both sides.

## MUCH DAMAGE TO THE DREDGE BEAVER BY FIRE YESTERDAY

Blaze of Unknown Origin in Big Mud-Digger Caused Considerable Loss to Expensive Plant—Indirect Loss Through Delay to Dredge's Operation Will Be Very Heavy.

The dredge Beaver, owned by the Beaver Dredging Company, was damaged to the extent of thousands of dollars yesterday morning while she was anchored in Rodney Bay, West End. About 8 o'clock the fire was discovered in a section of the dredge away from the boilers, and was first seen by Capt. Dunlop, commander of the dredge.

The fire is supposed to have started in a room where oil was kept and although those on board the dredge are unable to state what caused the fire, it is supposed a lantern exploded.

One of the crew was in this part of the dredge about ten minutes before the fire was discovered and there was no sign of fire at that time.

As soon as Capt. Dunlop discovered the fire, he sounded the dredge's whistle and the tugs in the vicinity also blew their whistles for help. The government tug Helena, the tug Lord Bessford, owned by the Maritime Dredging Company, the tug Neptune and the Dirigo hastened to the scene and did valuable work pouring streams of water on the flames.

An alarm was also sent in and although the West Side firemen responded quickly, it was a very long time before they had any water to pour on the fire. The hose was stretched near No. 7 berth but it is said, that owing to a defective valve, the water could not be turned on and about an hour's delay was caused.

There is a fire plug near the ferry dock on Rodney wharf and after some delay District Engineer McAndrews got his men to work and lines of hose were stretched from this plug to the dredge. The streams were taken across the dock in boats to the burning dredge. It was then that the firemen were enabled to do effective work.

Dredge Badly Gutted. The owners of the dredge were quite anxious at one time, owing to the large quantity of water being poured into the dredge, fearing she would sink, but the tugs stood by ready to tow her to a safe place and pump the water out of the hull.

The fire completely gutted the interior of the dredge and even burned down to the timbers on which the machinery, weighing over 300 tons, is bolted.

District Engineer McAndrews and the West Side firemen worked hard all morning, and were given able assistance by George Waring the superintendent of ferries. It was thought in the end that the dredge was saved.

Canada a Borrowing Country. Another fact upon which Mr. White dwelt was that Germany and France, where the agricultural credit societies flourish, are loaning, not borrowing countries and cheap capital can be procured easily because of the fact that capitalists were familiar with their conditions. Canada is a borrowing country. Also, it was a question whether these societies could be established in communities where settlement was sparse, where people did not know each other intimately. If such a system were adopted, he said, it should be uniform over the Dominion. He added some remarks as to the system which prevails in Europe whereby mortgages run for 20 or 30 years with provision for gradual extension. Such loans, he said, had not been adopted in Canada.

As for state loans to farmers, while complimentary to Mr. Buchanan, he declined to promise to favor the idea. The capital used by farmers was so enormous, Mr. White said, that it was impossible to put it at a system which would treat all localities and all individuals alike would lead the Dominion in expenditures too great for its resources, especially in view of the many outlays necessary on public works. Mr. White discussed the "Branch" vs. "Unit" system of banking for a moment. Incidentally, he said that last autumn two Canadian banks had loaned fifty million dollars in the west at crop moving time. Also, one of the banks had in the west deposits almost exactly half its loans there.
