### CIVIC ELECTION IN SACKVILLE TUESDAY

Two Full Tickets in Field and Lively Contest Expected—Takes Up Farming in Westmorland.

**Wild Throws Costly.**

The umpire declared the runner safe, arguing that the netting was there only as protection and not to check throw balls. Under an existing rule base runners are entitled to two bases on throws into the stand, and the umpire made the same ruling regarding the throw into the netting. Now a rule makes it plain that the base runner or runners shall be entitled to two bases on thrown balls which lodge in the wire screen.

Governor John K. Tener, president of the National League, has impressed upon umpires the necessity of correct rulings and good judgment on instances arising during games, also making it plain to the umpires that he does not consider them infallible. An official who turns to Governor Tener for support of an arbitrary or unfair stand will get nothing cheering.

**THE DEBATE ON BUDGET IS RESUMED**

Hon. H. R. Cameron asked the government if there was any truth in the rumors printed in eastern papers to the effect that an order-in-council had been passed providing for additional federal assistance in regard to the construction of bridges on the St. John River Valley Railway.

Hotels, E. Foster replied that that proposition had been put before the government in regard to the matter, but it was still under consideration and no order-in-council had been passed.

The debate on the budget was resumed by Mr. W. F. Carroll. Mr. Carroll laid down his own tariff policy. "I believe that the infant industries which cannot capture the home market should be given a rational measure of protection."

He said, amid cries of heat, that when these industries have gone abroad and successfully competed in the markets of the world, continued the tariff should be lowered.

Mr. F. R. Lalor asked whether the member would apply this to the Dominion Steel Company.

Mr. Carroll said that the government of another government does to help the steel industry has my hearty and unqualified support, asserted the member for St. John's Cape Breton.

Mr. Carroll said that while the \$3.50 duty on steel rods looked like a good thing for the steel manufacturers, it did not mean all that it appeared to mean.

The member for Cape Breton also criticized the form of the resolution which provided for free entry of steel rods bought outside of Canada prior to a certain date.

Mr. Carroll congratulated the Finance Minister upon the imposition of a duty on structural iron and steel, although he said he would have preferred to have the industry encouraged by the payment of a bounty.

Mr. Carroll urged that the government should take the duties off four, whereupon Mr. Lalor observed that he would like to see the duties off four and put it on steel.

Mr. Carroll went on to say that for the Liberal party he could say this: "We will give the farmers free agricultural implements if we get into power."

Amidst the laughter which ensued upon this remark, Mr. Lalor observed that the Liberal party had had 18 years in which to carry out that policy but had failed to do so.

### Liberals Embodiment of Inconsistency

Mr. Wilcox, of North Essex, who followed, began a reference to the importance of the budget debate accompanied by a declaration that with all its weaknesses, the party system of government had proved to be the best. To this Sir Wilfrid Laurier assented with a hearty "hear, hear."

## EMPIRE AS A WHOLE FAVORS HOME RULE

Manchester Guardian Says Colonies are All for Granting it to Ireland as They Found it a Success.

London, April 16.—"One of the strongest imperial reasons for setting up Irish Home Rule," says the Manchester Guardian, "is that the empire as a whole strongly wishes us to set it up. The Canadian parliament has five times over passed resolutions in sympathy with the Irish request for home rule. The Australian senate and house of representatives have both petitioned the crown in the same sense. Every colonial premier who attended the last imperial conference was in favor of Home Rule for Ireland. The colonies and their statesmen are naturally for home rule because they have tried it. Here and there you may find a leading colonial politician who, being perhaps of Orange descent, is against home rule."

## MUST KEEP THE SECRET FROM OTHER NATIONS

Injunction Restraining Company from Revealing Construction of Torpedo Used by U. S. Navy is Made Permanent.

Washington, April 15.—A temporary injunction granted by Judge Veeder in the United States district court of New York, restraining the E. W. Bliss Company from revealing to other nations the construction of the Bliss-Leavitt torpedo used by the United States navy, has been rendered permanent.

Billings, Mont., April 15.—Kid Fortney of Indianapolis, was injured here last night in a prize fight with Roy Coughlin of Cody, Wyo., and died today.

He was knocked down in the seventh round and his head struck the floor. From then until he was unconscious, Coughlin is being held on order of the coroner. An inquest will be held tomorrow.
