MONCTON FIRM GETS CONTRACT FOR SCHOOL

F. Neil Brodie, of St. John, the Architect - Contract price \$100,737.

The Moncton Transcript last evening announced that Paul Lea Co. of Moncton had been awarded the contract for the erection of the new high school building in the railway town. The Transcript says: The Board of School Trustees met at three o'clock this afternoon following an adjourned meeting held last night when the tenders for the Aberdeen School building were opened. The architect, Mr. Brodie, St. John, was in attendance this afternoon and the figures of the various tenders as worked out on a terra cotta basis for the columns, etc., were as follows: Paul Lea Co., with wooden columns, \$97,261; terra cotta columns, \$98,059; Dominick M. LeBlanc with terra cotta columns, \$98,785; Rhodes-Curry Co., on the same basis, \$99,000; R. A. Corbett, on wooden column basis, \$99,000; Paulker McDonald, \$107,831; Tilman D. LeBlanc, \$99,472, or on a terra cotta column basis, \$10,800.

Paul Lea Co.'s tender also provided that in the event of substituting terra cotta cornice for galvanized iron the contract would be \$100,737. As it is well known local climatic conditions are very hard on galvanized iron spouts or eave troughs or cornices and the board was unanimously of the opinion that for the small difference asked by Mr. Lea it was better to substitute a well known local climatic condition. The cost of the permanent maintenance of the school in painting would be largely decreased by a better present outfit.

The motion was carried unanimously.

The contract for the building was signed by Paul Lea for the Paul Lea Co. this afternoon. The work will be commenced at once.



DOWN ELEVATOR SHAFT.

J. Harold Power, shipper at the Goodyear Tire and Rubber Co., 83 Prince Island street, had a narrow escape from serious injury yesterday morning when he tripped into the elevator shaft on the top floor. Had he not by a miracle been able to cling for a moment to the edge of the landing, he would have met certain death far below.

In some manner, while working in the upper floor, Mr. Power tripped and slipped into the well. He managed to cling to the side and shouted for help. John W. Dobbins, city traveler, who happened to be two floors below, rushed to the elevator shaft and saw the predicament the man was in. It was useless to attempt to get to the top floor in time to avert the fall, so Mr. Dobbins dropped the hatch, which shortened the drop by half.

Mr. Power was compelled to release his hold. In the fall he escaped serious injury. He sprained his right wrist, however, and injured his right leg. His friends were relieved that he sustained nothing more serious. He was taken to his home, 310 Princess street.

The Board of Trade has received an invitation for its members to attend the International Irrigation Congress, to be held at Stockton, California, on Sept. 13 and 14, Fresno 15th and 16th, Sacramento 17th and 18th, San Francisco Sept. 20th.

The subjects to be considered include: Colonization and settlement of land, irrigation methods and results, financial factors affecting irrigation, with a general governor's and irrigation congress day at the close.
