Common Council Regular Meeting

Natural History Society Ask for Additional Grant—Application for Establishment of Juvenile Court—Other Business Transacted.

The regular meeting of the Common Council was held yesterday morning. A committee from the Natural History Society was present and asked on behalf of the Association for restoration of the regular \$4000 interest of \$300 which was allowed last year. Further, that an additional grant be given this year. The delegates pointed out the value of having such an institution in the city and that the Society had been compelled to use reserve funds, as the annual revenue was up wards of \$300 less than the expenditure. The Mayor gave assurance that the matter of a grant would be given careful consideration.

A. R. Crookshank read a petition, signed by the several societies, urging the Mayor and Commissioners to support an application to the Municipal Council for the establishment of a juvenile court for the city and county; further, that the Common Council provide in this year's estimates an amount of \$5,000 to be used for the establishment of a city juvenile court in case the municipality does not set up the proposed court.

In answer to a question Mr. Crookshank said it was the aim of the movement to have the courts for children entirely separate and apart from the regular Police Court, and that both judge and probation officer would be appointed by the Government.

The Mayor said that the Council would not favor the establishment of a juvenile court until the Council was convinced that it would be protected from the possibility of being scandalized by a judge appointed by the Government and paid by this city. "We do not want any more judges of that kind, and will require protection in the proposed act," the Mayor remarked.

The Mayor said it must be strictly understood that the city, not having a pension scheme in force, could not undertake to give any assurance in regard to a retiring allowance.

It was finally decided that the Council take up with the city solicitor the question of having in the proposed juvenile court act, a clause which would protect the members of the Common Council in the same measure that the members of a government are protected from "scandalizing" by a judge of the proposed court. Further, assurance was given the delegation that the commissioners, as councilors, would give the matter of the establishment of the court careful consideration.

Commissioner Fisher moved that the Commissioner of Public Works be authorized to call for tenders for paving Douglas Avenue and City Road, and that the plans and specifications for the work be subject to approval of the city engineer. Carried.

Commissioner Bullock moved that he be authorized to expend an additional \$3,000 at the West Side ferry approach, to provide for bumpers of piling, to be constructed by day's work and to be paid for by bond issue. Carried.

Adjourned.

Delegates Pleased With Reception

Members of N.B.A.A. Executive Attended Meeting of Moncton Auto Owners and Many Interesting Matters Were Dealt With.

The St. John delegates from the New Brunswick Automobile Association who met members and other automobile owners in Moncton, Wednesday night, returned to the city yesterday, and all speak in the highest terms of the reception given them and the keen interest being displayed by the Association members in the thriving railway city. The meeting in the City Council Chambers was large attended, and matters regarding the aims of the Association, the work done in the past, and what was expected to be accomplished in the future was gone into thoroughly.

F. E. Dennison presided at the first part of the meeting, and on being called away, the chair was taken by A. J. Tingley.

Percy W. Thomson, chairman of the Good Roads Committee, gave a brief history of the Association since its organization in 1902. He said its object was, first, the self-protection of members against any legislation that might be enacted against their interests. The Association had operated with the Dominion Parks' Association in the prevention of fires, and thus assisted in saving much money to the province. They had distributed many road signs, and also had taken up the question of having the rule of the road changed to drive to the right. Good roads and a road patrol system were among their many objects.

The Association had offered to sign the whole Province, but the Minister of Public Works had taken the matter as his own. The Association had proposed the imposition of any direct tax on autos for the upkeep of the highways, and also opposed the law calling for dimming of lights, as New Brunswick had a lot of indifferent roads where it was dangerous practice to dim lights. The speaker spoke of the many other benefits which an automobile member received by being a member of the Association, among which were its affiliation with the American Automobile Association and the Canadian Automobile Association.

J. P. Tilton, the Treasurer of the Association, gave a detailed report of the receipts and expenditures of the Association. F. A. Dryden, one of the directors, also addressed the meeting, putting forth many benefits that car owners received by being a member of the Association.

Several of the Moncton gentlemen, including E. W. Givan, F. E. Dennison, A. J. Tingley, Hon. F. J. Sweeney, F. R. Sumner, ex-Alt. P. Q. Belliveau and Mr. Marvin, also ex-Mayor H. M. Wood, of Sackville, gave brief addresses, all being in favor of the work being accomplished by the Association, and felt that the membership should be greatly enlarged.

A motion adopting the policy of road patrol was passed. A hearty vote of thanks was tendered the St. John delegates, and the intimation was made that meetings would be held in other Provincial centres.

Yesterday morning the St. John men were given an automobile tour about Moncton, through the kindness of George Rideout, the popular Chief of Police of that city.

Police Court Cases Yesterday

Several Charges of Drunkenness and With Having Liquor — Other Cases Remanded — Evidence in Charge Against Policeman.

Four of those who will still persist in having a wee droop despite the mandate of the law, appeared in the police court yesterday morning. Three of the number, charged with drunkenness, pleaded not guilty and were remanded; the fourth, Leonard Gallant, was charged with having liquor in his possession other than is private dwelling. The case was postponed until this morning, as there was a woman in Gallant's company at the time of the arrest, and her presence is also desired by the court. The arrest was made at midnight Wednesday by Detective Saunders and Inspector Merrifield, at the Imperial Hotel.

The afternoon session saw four more violators of the liquor law before the court, they were all remanded. One of them a woman, Elizabeth Dunlap, is charged with vagrancy in addition to the liquor charge.

The moccasins case was postponed as counsel for the defense, W. A. Ryan, was unable to appear on his client's behalf, owing to illness.

Nathan Melzer pleaded not guilty to a charge of cruelty to his horse. The case will be heard Saturday morning.

The cross-examination of Turnkey Clifford took up the greater part of the afternoon. Mr. Clifford stated that he did not hear Policeman Thomas say "You are under arrest." He did not resist Thomas as the latter had arrested him illegally, and there could therefore be no resistance. The two witnesses were in a position to hear everything that occurred on the steps. He did not know where they were when he was taken up the street.

The Turnkey said he did not take hold of the baton; did not hear defendant say, "Don't take hold of that baton again," "Don't do that again." Thomas did not say anything.

J. A. Barry pointed out that Mr. Bagnell in his evidence stated that Thomas had made that statement, "Don't take hold of that baton again." Bagnell was right or wrong. Witness said Bagnell was wrong.

Witness said Thomas was afraid to use the baton before Messrs. McArthur and Bagnell.

The case was adjourned until Monday afternoon at two o'clock.
