From Ottawa.

Ottawa, April 10. Governor Archibald of Manitoba last autumn expressed a desire to be relieved from his official position, but at that time there were obstacles in the way of the Government complying with his request. He has lately again tendered his resignation, which has now been definitely accepted.

Judge Johnson will administer the Government of the Province till a permanent appointment is made.

The King of Spain has made Col. Bernard the Deputy Minister of Justice, Knight Commander of the Royal order of Isabella Catholic.

London, April 9.

John Bright, replying to an address from some Republicans declaring he was destined to be the first President of the Republic of Great Britain, writes that he hopes it will be a long time before Englishmen are called upon to decide between a Republic and a Monarchy.

Bright expressed a doubt as to whether Republicans are his real friends.

The German Bishops will meet in Fulda on Wednesday. Conference lasts two days, and will be held with closed doors.

Revolutions in Mexico are advancing on Matamoros and were within 50 miles yesterday. Martial law is proclaimed and the greatest excitement exists.
