China denied that she had been asked to join the Entente powers.

John Hearst, brother of Premier Hearst, is dead at Sault Ste. Marie. A British steamer rammed and sank a submarine in the Straits of Gibraltar. John Redmond is convinced that the

war will come to an end sooner than most people believe. An Austrian has invented a method of warming by electricity underclothing formen in the trenches.

Many Canadians living in the United States have sent subscriptions to the War Loan to Ottawa.

The Metagama reached England safely, carrying 59 officers and 1,581 mer, Canadian troops.

The Emperor of Austria admits that three of the principal members of his Cabinet have resigned.

Soldiers prematurely discharged at Quebec will be treated as it no such discharges had been given.

The Allan Liner Corsician brought \$214 wounded and medically unfit soldiers to St. John, N.B. The United States will only grant to

members of the Ford peace party pass-ports to neutral countries.

Canada's war loan subscription books have closed, the loan having been over-subscribed more than twice.

The troopship "Metagama" arrived safely in England with more than sixteen hundred men on board.

The estimated cost of the Toronto-London Hydro-radial railway system is between \$13,000,000 and \$14,000,000.

Serbian troops, retiring from Monastir, have effected a junction with the French army, and both will now fight together. Toree Hungarians, with tickets for the Oscar II., Ford's peace ship, were arrested at Sarnia and sent to Toronto to be interned.

The battalion in the First Over Contingent commanded by Colonel Hall is said to have suffered severely in a ecent engagement.

Notices of allotment of Canada's War Loan will be mailed toward the latter part of the week. Total subscriptions will reach \$105,000,000.

Payments for war horses to Mr James R. Fallis, Conservative M.P.P. for Peel, amounted to \$63,540, according to evidence of the Royal Commission.

Rev. George Grey, a Presbyterian minister in Alingty, Saskatchewan, arrested on a charge of sedition, has been liberated with an admonition. Northern Ontario districts were authorized to form a complete infantry battalion. The counties of Grey and Simcoe also were authorized to form

ALLIED LEADERS CONFER.

Important Meeting of War Lords Occurs at Calais.

PARIS, Dec. 6.—Official announcement was made here yesterday of the meeting at Calais Saturday of representatives of France and Great Britain. The statement issued by the Foreign Office follows:

"An important France-British conference was held verterday at Calais."

"An important Franco-British conference was held yesterday at Calais. It was attended by the British Prime Minister, Mr. Asquith; the First Lord of the Admiralty, Mr. Balfour; the War Secretary, Earl Kitchener; the Chief of the Imperial Staff at army headquarters in London, Sir Archibald Murray; the French Premier, M. Briand; the Director of Political Affairs of the French Foreign Office, M. Margarie; the French War Minister, Gen. Gallieni, with Gen. Graziani, Chief of Staff; the French Minister of Marine. Admiral La Case.

ani, Chief of Staff; the French Min-ister of Marine, Admiral La Case, with Admiral de Jonquieres, Chief of the Naval Staff, and Gen. Joffre, with Gen. Pelle.

"After lunching together, the con-ference began at 2.30 o'clock and lasted until six, during which time the principal questions uppermost at present were discussed.

Workmen Blow Up Munition Plant.
LONDON, Dec. 6.—Destruction of
a large ammunition factory at Halle,
Prussian Saxony, by an explosion,
with the loss of several hundred
lives, is reported in a message from
Kolding, Denmark, to Copenhagen,
as forwarded by Reuter's correspondent. Discontented workmen are
suspected, the message says, of having caused the explosion.
It is said a similar disaster was
harrowly avoided at Bogden, Silesia.
The ammunition factory there, it is
reported, was saved by the discovery
that it had been undermined. According to this account, which has
not been confirmed, arrests have
been made at Bogden.
