

NEW BRUNSWICK.

(Entered Confederation 1st July 1867.)

*Biography, Governor. By Honorable the Honourable Robert Desveaux Wilmer, P.C., Esq., of John W. Wilmer, Esq., who sat for St. John's in N.B. Assent for many years, by Sir George Hartley, late of Squires' Wigging, Esq., member of St. John, and Attorney of Capt. Edmund Wilmer, Barrister of the Royal Arm. Regt., who settled in N.B. at the close of the Am. revolution (See Sabine's *American Loyalists*), B. in Fredericton, N.B., in Oct. 1860. Ed. in St. John. Married 1833, Miss Mowat, of St. Andrews. Was in shipyards as a shipwright and was a dir. of the Quebec and N.B. Railway Co. Was a mem. of Ex. Comittee, N.B., from 1861 to 1864, from 1858 to 1867, again in his own Govt. In 1863, and again in 1866 until the Union held office of Surveyor General from 1861 to 1864; and that of Prov. Secy., from 1866 to 1867. Was Mayor of St. John 1849; a delegate to Confederate Council of Trade, Quebec, 1875; and to the Colonial Conference on the Union of the R.N.A. Colony, London, 1866-67. Was appd. a Commr. on behalf of Can. to the Philadelphia Exhibition 1876. Holds a patent of rank and precedence from Her Majesty as an Ex. Comptroller, N.B. Sat for St. John, city and county, in N.B. Assent, from 1840 until 1844, and from 1848 until the Union. Called to the Senate by Royal Proclamation, May 1867. Sworn a mem. of the Ulysses' Council, without portfolio, 8 Nov. 1878. Appd. Speaker of the Senate, 8 Nov. 1878, which position he resigned 1 Feb. 1880, on his appointment as Lieut. Governor of New Brunswick, see the Hon. E. B. Chandler, deceased.
