TEMPERANCE LECTURE.

On Tuesday evening last Mrs. Yeomans again visited Listowel, and gave a very entertaining lecture on the evils of intemperance and the benefits to be derived from prohibitory laws. The audience was quite large, and for over an hour listened with attention to the speaker, while she in affecting language depicted the woes caused both publicly and privately by the use of intoxicating drinks, and painted in glowing terms the benefits to families and to society that is sure to result if this "worst of curses" is removed from our country. Mrs. Yeomans in a forcible manner drew a parallel between license laws and the Decrees of Amasa, issued at the instigation of Haman for the total destruction of the Jewish race, as recorded in the Book of Esther, and concluded by expressing a hope that the day was not far distant when intemperance, like slavery, should be banished from the continent of America, and we should have another national holiday in commemoration of the glorious event. A hearty vote of thanks was tendered the lecturer by the audience.

Firemen's Excursion.—The Listowel Fire Brigade have made arrangements with the P. D. & L. H. R. Company for an excursion to Port Dover on our Civic Holiday. The day has not yet been fixed, but the 16th of August or thereabouts is mentioned as the probable time. It will be one of the cheapest excursions of the season, the round fare from Listowel being only \$1. Tickets will also be issued at proportionally low rates from all stations between Listowel and Woodstock. Further announcement will be given next week.

Accident.—The workmen engaged upon the improvements which are being made upon the Reeve's residence employ a large iron pulley in raising material to the scaffolding. On Monday a little daughter of Mr. Hay's took hold of the rope which was attached to the pulley, causing the heavy counter to tumble from the high scaffolding and alight upon her head. The concussion knocked the little thing over and made a very severe scalp wound. For a time it was thought her injuries were of a serious nature, but happily no alarming has resulted and she is now rapidly recovering. Considering the circumstances, her escape from instant death seems providential.

Dominion Day Excursion.—A grand excursion from Listowel to Port Dover, is announced to take place over the P. D. & L. H. Railway on Dominion Day. An excursion train will leave here at 6 a.m., calling at all stations along the line, and arrive at the Lake shortly after 11 o'clock. Nearly six hours will be made, during which a programme of sports and games, including several boat races, has been arranged by the citizens of Dover, for which prizes are offered. Other attractions are also announced, and there is every prospect of a very pleasant day being spent by the shores of Erie. A uniform railway fare of \$1.25 will be charged from points between Listowel and Stratford.

Both gentlemen are already well known in this section, and their previous connection with the business is sufficient warrant a successful future for the new firm. Their workshops—situated at the corner of Wallace and Inkerman streets, have recently been very much improved in order to accommodate the various branches of the extensive trade which they contemplate doing. Quitting Championship.—At the quitting championship tournament in Toronto last week, the Listowel club was worthily represented by Mr. Wm. Bright, who, in the opinion of the spectators, was the best player in the tournament. The following are the prizes handed by Mr. Wm. Rennie to the winners: First prize, championship of the Dominion; second, cash, \$12; Walter Glenening, Ellemere; third, cash, \$10; James Rennie, Toronto; fourth, cash, \$8; Wm. Bright, Listowel; fifth, cash, \$8; Walter J. Reid, Ayr; sixth, cash, \$7; James McLean, Galt; seventh, cash, \$6; Benjamin Milliken. The holder of the grand gold medal for the championship, therefore, is Walter Glenening, Ellemere; the holder of the Dufferin club medal for all quits not exceeding seven pounds in weight, James Rennie, Toronto; and the holder of the Johnston Cup for members of the G. N. C. C., James Rennie.

A Batch of Excursions.—The season of cheap railway excursions may now be said to have fairly set in. Posters setting forth their respective features of attraction are conspicuous at every public resort. They seem to increase and multiply about as fast as potato bugs or caterpillars. Some four or five are announced to take place within a fortnight, all of them having a local interest. The first on the tapis is an excursion under the auspices of the Simcoe Baptist Church to Niagara Falls, next Tuesday; trains are to be run over the P. D. & L. H. R. and Canada Southern, leaving Listowel at 6 a.m.; fare for the round trip, \$2.50, children half price. On Thursday, 27th, an excursion takes place from Stratford to Toronto; connection will be made with the morning train on the Stratford & Huron Railway. The fare from Stratford and return is \$1.50, which also includes a boat ride from Toronto to Scarborough Heights and admission to Victoria Park. The Dominion Day excursion to Port Dover, which we notice elsewhere, promises to be largely patronized by residents of this vicinity. Excursion trains will also be run over the G. W. R. on the 1st July. Either Kinardine or Southampton may be visited that day, the round fare from Palmerston by each train being only one dollar. In addition to the above the Great Western Company announce a cheap excursion to Hamilton and Niagara Falls on Friday next, June 28; train calls at all stations between Kinardine and Gowanus; fare to the Falls and return only \$1.25, children half price, with the privilege of remaining until the following day for \$1 extra. This is certainly a chance for a cheap trip. Train leaves Listowel station at 6.49 a.m.; arrives at Clifton at 12.20; returning leaves Clifton at 5.20. First-class coaches will be provided, and after leaving Palmerston the special excursion train runs through direct without detention, the tedious ordinary excursions will thus be obviated.
