AMPLE ACCOMMODATION

 London, July 9—Sir Frederick Treves, the British surgeon, who is on a tour of inspection of army hospitals, writes to The Times testifying that as a result of personal visits and close examination of hospitals in Malta, Cairo, Alexandria, Port Said and Mudros arrangements for caring for the wounded in these places are now quite adequate. All of these institutions, he writes are under the direction of competent doctors and nurses and contain ample beds. Eminent consulting surgeons throughout the world are in attendance. Owing to the unexpectedly large number of wounded, he adds, there have been periods of severe pressure and urgent stress, but they have been heroically met.

SUNK IN HALF AN HOUR
 By Special Wire to the Courier.
 Rome, via Paris, July 9—A despatch to The Giornale d'Italia from its Venice correspondent states that the Cruiser Amalfi, was torpedoed when thirty kilometers about 20 miles from the coast. Efforts to save the cruiser were regarded as useless, and orders for saving the crew were immediately given. The Amalfi sank within less than half an hour. Other ships of the division arrived at full speed, picking up men of the crew, five hundred of whom were saved. Two hospital ships were sent to the scene from Venice.

WILL CELEBRATE DAY
 By Special Wire to the Courier.
 Paris, July 9—Paris owes her safety to the national army and shall not stint her gratitude. This was the keynote of posters distributed last night, announcing that on July 14 Paris Day would be celebrated. Sisters, daughters and fiancées of those fighting at the front are to take collections on that day, the poster announces, to provide food and clothing for the mutilated and to obtain necessities for the men who are fighting as well as for those who have been driven from their homes by the invaders. The poster is signed by the president of the municipal council, and other public officials.

FEELING IS PESSIMISTIC OVER NOTE

Washington Fears Unsatisfactory Proposals are Being Submitted.

Washington, July 9—Information from Berlin that the German reply to the last American note would be handed to Ambassador to-day or tomorrow, together with the knowledge that the ambassador was to make no comment in advance of its delivery, brought the controversy between the United States and Germany to a critical point to-day.

The fact that the German reply was not modified from the form in which it was submitted to the American ambassador a few days ago was responsible for the feeling of pessimism because it is known that the proposals originally sent are not satisfactory to officials here. There is a proposition, however, to await the arrival of the text of the note itself so that the exact phraseology of the communication, may be taken into consideration.

Ambassador Gerard's despatches containing the outline of the note and even some of the excerpts from it were somewhat garbled in transmission and it is not altogether certain that all the points made by Germany are clearly understood as yet. Of the chief question at issue, however, the German Government, according to officials of the United States is not ready to concede Americans the right to travel anywhere on the high seas on unarmed merchant ships as contended for in the last American note. Germany has suggested that Americans may travel on belligerent ships if there is a guarantee in advance that they carry no munitions of war and are unarmed, and the vessels are marked in such a way as to be distinguished in the war zone to German submarines, and if there is notification of the departure and character of the ships.

To comply with the suggestions, in the view of many officials, would be tantamount to the giving of the American Government since it is not considered proper to notify one belligerent of the departure of another belligerent's ships.

SHAG PREDICTS TWO CANADIAN LEAGUE TEAMS TO DROP

Hamilton Herald: When Frank Shaughnessy, the link leader of the Ottawa champions makes a statement relative to the Canadian League it can usually be taken seriously. The big chap with the penchant for winning pennants is authority for the statement that it will not be long before the league is cut down to four clubs, with Guelph and St. Thomas being dropped. This change will take place, he expects, very soon, for the announcement in both cities has been alarmingly small. In St. Thomas it is as hard to draw the fans to Pinfar Park as it is to extract money from the bookmakers at the Hamilton Jockey Club meetings, and the situation in Guelph is almost as poor. Despite the fact that the Leafs are setting the pace the Royal City enthusiasts are not turning out, as the transferring of one or two of their home games to Galt indicates.

"Shag says that London, Hamilton, Ottawa and Brantford will make up the league when the change goes into effect.

There's a crowd of pastimers not more than 25 miles west of Hamilton that is commencing to make matters hum in the Canuck league. It's the aggregation controlled, bossed and patting on the back by the genial Tom Nelson, the Brants' manager. Recent additions have rounded into a dangerous outfit, and will no doubt soon be out of the cellar. They have no business there, and with a little team play that has hitherto been lacking they'll be up there battling at an early date. The Dykewilles have been guilty of too much individual work.

REISLING AFTER BARRY
 London Free Press: Manager Reisling was extremely anxious to have several of the new players here to-morrow to show the London fans that he is determined to provide the best obtainable in the summer pastime here, and may succeed in landing some new blood for the occasion. Barry of Bay City, who played first base for the Brantford Red Sox in 1911, and who was with Jersey City in 1913, may play for Brantford again this season, but if the present new first sacker at Brantford looks good Barry may catch on here as well as Hartwell, Beall and Blauser, all infielders.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.
 THE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made in any Dominion Lands Agency (but not in Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.
 Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within the miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A suitable house is required except where evidence is performed in the vicinity.
 In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price 3.00 per acre.
 Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homesteaded patent; also 80 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as an unoccupied patent on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homesteaded right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 80 acres and erect a house worth \$500.
 The area of cultivation is subject to re-duction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.
