SEVENTH ACCIDENT—Bakerman Daniel Hensley, of Truro, met with an accident in the railway yard at Moncton on Friday afternoon of last week. An examination of his injuries showed them to be serious. His spine is injured, and he is unable to get up. He is also severely internally injured. Hensley is a married man and resides in Truro, where he has a wife and one child.

DANGERS OF ELECTRICITY—A young man named Webber was instantly killed at Halifax on last Sunday evening. He was patrolman of the Chandler Electric Light Co., and on going his rounds he noticed one of the lights burning badly, he ascended the pole, threw his leg over the cross-tree and grasped the wires with both hands, which sent a current of electricity through him, killing him instantly. He fell backward, his legs still clinging to the wires. His hands were charred to the knees, and his legs badly burned. His body immediately turned black, and was considerably swollen. This is the first fatal accident in connection with the electric light in Halifax.

Since chronicling the above another young man named George Crocker met instantaneous death on Wednesday evening on the same post and in the same manner as Webber. These two fatalities, following each other in quick succession, demands a thorough investigation.

ON St. Mark's Day, April 25th, 1888, the Rev. Frederick Courtney, D. D., was consecrated Bishop of Nova Scotia in St. Luke's Cathedral, Halifax: it was, as may well be thought, a great day for the Anglican Church in Nova Scotia. The consecrating bishops were the Metropolitan, Bishop of Fredericton, and Bishop Cosgrove of Fredericton, the Bishops of Ontario, Quebec and Maine. The procession included the above named bishops, the bishop elect, nearly the entire body of the clergy of the diocese, a large number from the diocese of Fredericton, and a delegation sent to represent the American Church. The procession reached about a quarter of a mile, and consisted of bishops, priests, deacons and chorists all robed. They marched two and two from St. Luke's school-rooms to the cathedral, which was filled with an immense congregation. The Metropolitan officiated the Holy Eucharist, and with his assistant bishops consecrated the elect. A most powerful sermon was preached by the Rev. Canon Duggan of Toronto. The new bishop has won all hearts by his gracious manner and kind presence, and the promise there is of his wise building up of the great work so well begun by his great predecessor.
