

The Directors Meet—Fix the Date of the Fair for 1892 and Revise the Prize List.

The Unionville fair managers met on Friday last, President Barry in the chair. The other officers and directors present were: W. J. McDougall, 1st vice; B. Loverin, secretary; E. Davis, treasurer; N. H. Beecher, Wm. Neilson, Amos Mansard, John Forth, John Loverin, Joshua Gilroy, J. B. Saunders, directors. After the reading of the minutes of the last meeting the board proceeded to the revision of prize list for 1892. The dates for the annual exhibition were fixed for Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday Sept. 13th, 14th, and 15th.

Sec. 1, of Rules and Regulations to read one ledge and two tickets. The other clauses were passed as printed in last years prize list.

3rd prize on stallions struck out and the 1st prize on draught and carriage stallions raised to \$8 and \$4. Carriage teams to be 15 1/2 hands and over.

Matched team, roadsters, be \$6, \$4, \$2. Special prizes on stallions struck off.

Sec. 1 for Ag. purposes struck off. Fat ox or steer amended so as to read fat ox or cow. Succeeding section struck out.

SWINE.
The classes for 1892 will be Leicester, Shropshire, South Down, Oxford Down, and Grades. Prizes on all to remain as in prize list, except 3rd prize struck off.

Sec. 1 in Berkshire and grade amended, so as to put 1 year and over. Sec. 2 struck out. A new class Yorkshire added; prize to be same as Berkshire.

POULTRY.
Duckings, white, struck out. The word colored struck out of Sec. 14. 3rd prize on all fowl struck off and amended to each kind prize. Prize on chickens, 6 varieties to read, \$2 \$1.50.

GRAIN.
To remain as last year.

ROOTS.
White Elephant and Bell struck out, and Crown Jewel, and Rural New Yorker No. 2 inserted.

VEGETABLES.
Sec. 1 amended, so as to read blood beets, (turnip) 6. New section added blood beets (long red) 6.

BATHY, APART & C.
Display of apairian's appliances struck out, and 3rd prize struck off Sec. 7 to 12.

DOMESTIC MANUFACTURES.
Stair carpet, cloth felled, flannel kersey, wove, and shawl home made struck off. Sec. 25 to read quilt, patched or pieced, 26 struck out.

LADIES' WORK.
Sec. 8 to read cotton or linen. Sec. 9, 13, 17, struck out. Sec. 10 to read braiding on linen or worsted. Sec. 19 struck out. Sec. 21 to read suit of underclothing, to be all hand made; Sec. 30, 34, struck out; Sec. 36, 38, amended work, raised to \$2; \$1.50. To be added, coll. of drawn thread work, \$1.50, \$1.75; coll. of fancy work any kind, not named in prize list, \$2. \$1.50; ladies' hand bag, any material, \$1.00, 75; 50; best embroidered table spread; on felt, hand made, \$1.50, \$1.00, 50.

ARTS AND MAN'S'S.
Sec. 10 live birds, 3rd prize struck off. New section added best singing bird, in separate cage, \$1.00, 75, 50; painting on silk or satin \$1.00, 75, 50; painting on velvet, \$1, 75, 50. Ordered that all of class V. on Sec. 11 to 15 be placed in class W in new prize list—special coll. of paintings by amateur, be a distinct and separate entry from other paintings.

CARRIAGES, & C.
Road cart, of any kind \$2, \$1.50, \$1.00. The prize list as amended was then finally adopted as a whole. On motion Secretary, Forth and Jolly were appointed a committee on special—D. J. Forth, J. B. Saunders and E. Davis were appointed a special committee to examine and report on the probable cost of extending the horse track to 1/2 mile in length, and report at next meeting of the board. The meeting then adjourned to call of Pres. and Sec.


