Old Age Pension Bill Next Year.

The question of old age pensions was introduced to the delegates to the Trades Congress at Liverpool by G. Barnes, M. P., who moved a resolution urging upon the Government the necessity of establishing a national system of pensions for all men and women on attaining the age of 60 years of at least is a week, the entire cost of such scheme to be contributed by means of imperial taxation.

He moved, further, that the Parliamentary committee be instructed to bring pressure upon Parliament to secure the passing of an old age pensions bill during next year. The fact, said Mr. Barnes, that so many people in Great Britain were on the verge of poverty, and that so many thousands were dependent on Bumbledom, was discreditable to a rich country like this.
